A recent marriage in Idaho was Mr. Korn and Miss Cobb.

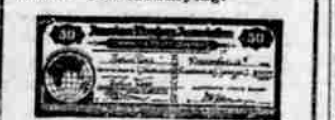

SISTERS' ACADEMY.

Studies will be resumed September 21. The staff of teachers has been assigned for the school year. A new instructor in music, Sister M.
