PEACE NOT IN SIGHT.

Guard: There is not at the present time one encouraging feature for peace in the European military and political embroglio. In fact it would seem from the military situation that peace at the present time was almost an impossibility. The preponderance of military achievement is unquestionably with the Teutonic allies, and no peace is possible which will admit of the materialistic aggrandizement of Germany, or the retention by that country of territory, conquered, or successfully invaded at the present time.

The recent message from the Pope to President Wilson is an indication that Germany would welcome peace and the articles which have appeared in the American press stating under what terms Germany would make peace were undoubtedly inspired, and publications of them is a further indication that the Teutonic allies would welcome peace proposals. This is to be expected as the military position of Austria and Germany at the present time is excellent, and the success with which the Turks have kept the allies from Constantinople places those countries in a position to make most advantageous terms of peace. But, as it has taken the two different national alignments to make war, it will take the same combinations to conclude a satisfactory peace. And at the present writing the position of the Quadruple Entente is not such as would lead the uninformed world to believe that those powers could afford to even consider peace.

War Is Topic of British Scientists.

Manchester, England, Sept. 7.—War talk dominated the annual meeting of the British Bar Association, the leading scientific organization of England, when the scientists convened here today. Prof. Arthur Schuster, president of the association, in his annual address will deal with the great prominence of science in the present European conflict. It is the opinion of many leading English scientists that science will eventually determine the outcome of the war. A sectional meeting of economics will take up the labor situation, British credit, currency and finance.
