Chaplin and his company sailed from San Pedro yesterday intending land at the Long wharf for the night. The sea was so rough, however, that it was impossible to put in. Robinson and Twonley attempted to go ashore in a skiff. They were hurled into the breakers and cast high and very wet on the sand after 15 minutes of severe buffeting.

When daylight dawned, Chaplin got into communication with the Japanese fishing village by means of wig-wag signals and a dory, carrying food, put out to the tossing vaquero.
