EVANGELIST GAVE HIS IDEAS ON SABBATH DAY

"As a statue is unveiled and shown forth in its beauty, so it shall be my purpose to unveil this doctrine of the seventh-day and show it forth in its beauty," were the opening words of Evangelist Meikeljohn's lecture last night at the Cotton Tabernacle, Seventh and Ferry streets. The speaker took for his text the words of the Savior, "The Sabbath was made for man." Mark 2:27. Jan. 1:1-3 was then read to show that Christ made all things, therefore the Sabbath.

Turning to Gen. 2:1-3 the speaker called attention to the fact that the Sabbath was made before sin, and "sanctified" that is "set aside for a holy, religious use." Man being the only one to use it, it was given to him before sin. The fourth commandment was then read Ex. 20:8-12. From this and other texts the Evangelist showed that the Sabbath had been in existence before. The fact was emphasized that the commandment requires "the seventh day" not merely a seventh part of time. Furthermore God wants that day kept because He kept it. To show that this applies to others aside from the Jew the speaker read Isa. 56:1-7.

Attention was called to the New Testament. "Here we find, said the speaker, that Christ kept the Sabbath (Lu. 4:16) and He told His disciples to keep it. Matt. 24:20. He did not want them in flight on the Sabbath during tribulation, and that tribulation continues in varying degrees to the second coming of Christ. Matt. 24:29, 30. Thus Christ taught the perpetuity of the Sabbath, and we should do as He did. 1 Jn. 2:6; 2 Jn. 9.

The speaker further states that after the resurrection of Christ, Paul kept the Sabbath. Acts 17:2. The Gentile Christians kept it. Acts 13:42-45. Paul taught that it should be kept. Heb. 4:9-11 (See margin, or American Revised Version). Here Paul tells us "There remaineth a Sabbath keeping to the people of God," and also that we should cease from our works "as God did from His," and that we found to be the seventh day, said the speaker. "So Paul teaches Sabbath-keeping. The Acts of the apostles shows that there were 85 meetings held on the Sabbath and only one the first day of the week and it took place at night. And furthermore between the two lids of the Bible there is not a word authorizing the keeping of the first day of the week.

Concluding, the speaker read Isa. 56:22, 23 showing that the Sabbath will be kept in Heaven. He said in part, "We find that God kept and commanded the observance of the seventh day. Thus Jesus kept it and taught it and Paul also, and finally we find that if we get to heaven, and I hope we all shall, we shall keep the Sabbath there. Then let us stand on the Bible only and keep it now."

Tonight's subject is creating quite an interest it being announced as "The Devil's Footprints in Religion." The subject for Sunday night will be "Uncle Sam in the Bible."
