Polk Won.

Polk county carried off the honors among the counties at the state fair, with a score of 93.75. Benton was second with 93.5, Lane third with 93.25 and Clackamas fourth with 88 points. The judges were W. K. Newall, of Washington county; Luther J. Chapin, of Marion county and the county agriculturalist, Jones, of Tillamook county. While Benton county lost, that county is taking pride in the fact that it took a Benton county man to put together the exhibit, Jas. E. French doing the work.

Linn county had a good exhibit and was fifth; but it was not collected until the last minute, with little time for preparation.

Using Fictitious Name.

Eugene Guard—George Bell, of Eugene, is in the toils of the law. He is alleged to have shipped liquor into Lane county under an assumed name, an action which constitutes a violation of the state law. Bell signed the signature, "A. R. Lee," on the register of shipments of alcoholic liquors, at Junction City, according to the complaint, which was drawn by District Attorney J. M. Devers late yesterday afternoon, following the receipt of advices from City Marshal Butler, of that place.

Bell was arrested by Chief of Police Christensen last night, following the issuance of a warrant.

The purpose of the law, which Bell is charged with violating, is to enable the officers to detect bootleggers through excessive receipts of liquor. By receiving such shipments under an assumed name, the suspicion of the officers would not be aroused, and a person engaged in illicit traffic in intoxicants might escape detection.

Eucalyptus Growers Meet.

San Francisco, Sept. 30.—California growers of the eucalyptus tree, known as the "wonder tree," were in convention here today in the Lumberman's building or House of Hoo Hoo at the Panama Pacific exposition.

The eucalyptus tree is called the "wonder tree" because it grows ten times as fast as hickory, oak or mahogany and yields lumber which is harder and better than these native trees.

The convention of the Eucalyptus Hardwood Association will hold a joint meeting with the twenty-fourth annual convention of the Hoo-Hoo tomorrow.

400 FREIGHT CARS FOR LUMBER SHIPMENTS

William Sproule, president of the Southern Pacific, yesterday afternoon wired the Oregon public service commission that 400 empty freight cars are en route to Willamette valley points to meet the needs of Oregon shippers, chiefly lumbermen.

The telegram was received in response to a message to President Sproule by the commission, which stated that investigation showed that the lumber industry in Portland and the Willamette valley is suffering intensely because of failure of the Southern Pacific to furnish cars for shipments to California. The commission demanded a reason for the car shortage and asked what relief might be expected.

After a long dull period Oregon lumber shippers have lately found a market in California, but have been unable to make shipments because of lack of cars.

SEVENTY-TWO CONVENTIONS AT FAIR THIS MONTH

There are seventy-two big and little conventions scheduled for the exposition during the month of October, and of these more than a dozen will be devoted to live stock and agriculture. The horse show is scheduled for the days between September 30 and October 13. Horticulture Week begins October 21.

The exposition management hopes to make November 2 the greatest day of the fair. This is to be San Francisco Day, and a crowd of 800,000 is the ambition. The largest crowd heretofore was that of "Opening Day" a total of 225,000. But every stress is placed on this final great day, and there is general confidence that the desired figure will be reached. One of the features calculated to attract is that of giving away twenty gifts of \$100 in cash to each of the twenty holding lucky numbers given away at the gates. Exhibitors have arranged to give away 100,000 gifts. Besides the monster parade, there will be a show battle during the afternoon between the United States army and the naval forces in the bay. At night the Monitor and the Merrimac will engage in a spectacular duel and the most magnificent of all the exposition fireworks will be on display. Of course the flyer will fly. It is expected that Art Smith, the Beloved will have returned by that time. Just now Charles Niles and Silvio Pettrossi are giving both day and night flights, and the flights prove great attractions. Christofferson is also flying in a monoplane, carrying passen-

gers about the bay at \$10 each. And he gets about a dozen each morning.

Atlantic Coast Attacked.

Washington, Oct. 1.—A heavy fleet of dreadnaughts and an auxiliary fleet of transport ships at sunrise today attacked the Atlantic coast from Norfolk to Cape Cod.

However, it was nothing to get excited about—just the beginning of the annual naval war game for the Atlantic fleet under the direction of Admiral Frank F. Fletcher.

In the coast attack last spring the U. S. navy was badly licked owing to a shortage of swift battle cruisers. The enemy landed on the Virginia coast under cover of a heavy fog and captured Washington with little difficulty.

Bryan to Turn to Religious Work.

Lincoln, Neb., Oct. 1.—That William Jennings Bryan is fully aware of the extent and scope of his present unpopularity, but that he is buoyed up by the confident belief that he will be vindicated by future events, became known to the ex-secretary of state's close friends during his recent visit to his Lincoln home.

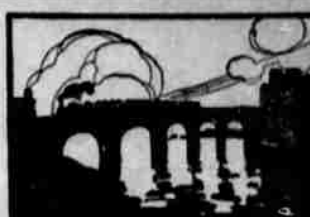
