CHARLIE CHAPLIN CAVORTS AT HUB THEATRE TONIGHT

Charlie Chaplin will cavort at the Hub theatre tonight. This popular comedian never gets tiresome, but grows in popularity every day. His funny antics are absolutely inimitable and the most chronic cynic cannot help but smile at his funny capers. It is not so much what Chaplin does as how he does it. And he puts enough original stuff at that. The offering tonight is "Dough and Dynamite," a two reel episode of laughs. There is also a big three reel feature play, "Leah, the Forsaken," a play of heart interest all the way through.

The supreme dramatic moment of the play occurs when a woman's heart is torn between devotion to the creed and traditions of her ancestors and her love for a man of different religion. To gain the man she loves she is forced to become an apostate, to relinquish her people and the religion which her ancestors have fought to keep inviolate through the centuries.

In the early part of the drama we are shown how the children of Israel have been persecuted from time immemorial. Religious bigots massacred them for their beliefs just as Russia has done in recent years. It seems scarcely creditable that religious passion should have been so inflamed as it was during the dark middle ages, when the Catholic church in Spain held its horrible inquisitions and the Protestants burned Catholics at the stake, while both turned on Mohammedan and Israelite and murdered

them because of difference in religious belief. Those days of heretic and witch burnings have gone forever, but the dramatic possibilities of the dark ages still have unlimited possibilities of exploitation. In "Leah the Forsaken" one's heart is torn with sympathy for the sufferings of a much persecuted race. The human element enters into the tragedy when the daughter of an aged rabbi is given refuge in the house of a local seigneur, whose son is attracted to her by her beauty.
