WHAT THE FORESTS ARE DOING IN THE U. S.

During the decade ending with the last fiscal year, the Forest Service has classified and opened to entry over 15,500 individual scattered tracts in the forests, covering over 1,700,000 acres. This classification has also resulted in eliminations, to date, of approximately 15,000,000 acres additional.

There are approximately 1,200 towns and cities in the United States dependent upon the national forests for the source of their water supply. From 10,000,000 to 15,000,000 little pines, firs and spruces are planted every year on the national forests,

and also several tons of tree seed are sown.

Of the 1913 lumber cut, over thirty billion feet of the total were from coniferous woods. 30 per cent of which was supplied by the State of Oregon and Washington.

Enough paving blocks were treated by the wood preserving plants in the United States during 1913 and 1914 to surface a street 36 feet wide and 211 miles long.

Salem, Oct. 4.—Campaign is being made for wagon road from Eugene to coast and half mill tax asked for.

J. A. Seavey will erect \$20,000 theatre in Springfield.

J. C. Butcher will establish large spray factory at Hood River and manufacture arsenate of lead.

The Creswell cannery will manufacture spray in that city.

Bandon—New cheese factory to be built at Four Mile.

Bend—Frank Pival expects to erect 50 houses here, work to begin at once.

Roseburg citizens will donate site for the big new mill of Kendall Bros. A town which has shown the enterprise of Roseburg in going after this big industry is deserving of a bright future.

Portland taxes for 1915 estimated at \$93,000 more than for 1914, an effort will be made to cut this amount, however.

Eugene will soon have Coos Bay coal.

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MADAME JOMELLI TOLO SOME INTERESTING THINGS

One Story Was About a Woman Married 4 Times, Each Husband Different Nationality.

In her round table luncheon at the Hotel Albany yesterday afternoon, with fourteen or fifteen Albany women, Madame Jomelli talked very freely about her likes and dislikes, and also told some interesting things about the war. She knows one woman in Europe, one of prominence who has been married four times. One husband was a Russian, one a German, one a Frenchman and the other an Italian. By each husband she had one son, and when the war broke out the sons entered it with the troops of their nationality, three being with the Allies, one with the Germans. On one occasion all four visited their mother, none at that time being killed. Madame Jomelli has two sisters, and all three married men of different nationalities. The Madame is now suing for divorce from her husband.

She declared that of all countries she likes the United States the best of all, and of the U. S. she likes the west the best, and then she likes the country best of all. She doesn't care for the big cities, and dislikes San Francisco very much. She would like to be 30 miles from any railroad, surrounded by cows, horses, pigs and dogs, amidst the best in nature.

When the Madame left Paris, in fashions everything was black and white, even the house furnishings, a pretty effect that was meeting with great favor. Regardless of the war much attention is paid there to dress.

Madame Jomelli speaks English well, and proved a very pleasing entertainer, the visit with her being one that will long be remembered by those present.
