Some Mortgage.

Telegram:—A \$500,000 mortgage on the Pittock block, executed by H. L. Pittock and Georgiana Pittock in favor of the Prudential Insurance company of New Jersey, was filed for record with County Clerk Coffey this morning. The mortgage and rights of the Pittocks as lessors to Herbert Fleishacker secure a half million dollar note in favor of the insurance company.

As collateral security Pittock assigned to the insurance company the proceeds of a 99-year lease held by Herbert Fleishacker, executed November 22, 1912.

Under the terms of the Pittock-Fleishacker lease, at the end of the 99-year term the Pittock building will revert to the Pittock estate. The lease specified that the building must cost not less than \$650,000.

SATURDAY WILL BE FIRE PREVENTION DAY

A National Effort Being Made to Lesson the Enormous Damage By Fire.

Next Saturday will be fire prevention day all over the U. S. Some of the big cities will have parades in order to impress upon people the necessity of more care. Every day the average record is twenty-two dead and wounded in this country, besides the enormous loss of property.

Schools will give special attention to this, teachers impressing the importance of the fire rules laid down by the school as well as the need for reasonable care at all times in the home. The value of child training in this direction is too apparent to require emphasis. The majority of our fires originate in the home and the majority of those who cause these fires are children. And only too frequently they pay the penalty. Statistics compiled in London, England, show that of 151 deaths caused by fire, 62 were children under twelve, making the proportion of their loss approximately forty per cent of the total death toll.

Business houses, especially factories, are expected to take advantage of this week to warn and instruct employees; and to insure great safety through the removal of unnecessary fire hazards, and providing adequate means for extinguishing fire.

With these various endeavors paving the way, the big day at the close of the week bids fair to make so lasting an impression, great benefits are sure to accrue—and Fire Prevention Day will be in truth a concerted, national action against a merciless enemy. This day is born of the germ that has made America first among the nations of the earth. The germ that produced the railway, steamboat, telegraph, telephone, that demanded of science protection against disease—that gave birth to liberty. Yet we are still slaves to fire because we have not organized against it.

Fire Prevention Day is a great national endeavor to have all the people at the same time thinking, talking and working to protect their lives, homes and their cities against that most cruel and wanton of all losses—fire. Fire Prevention Day is America's opportunity and America's duty. It is the day when every citizen should do his part to help close the red route to destruction.
