UTILITIES COM. MAKES ORDER AGAINST DISCRIMINATION

Requires Interchange of Traffic
in One Case If Given in
Another.

Salem Statesman: By an order issued by the public service commission yesterday the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company is required to afford the Perkins hotel of Portland the same facilities with respect to interchange of traffic, and upon the same terms, as are now afforded to the Wright-Dickinson Hotel company at the Oregon hotel, and to afford to all other hotels in Portland similarly provided with dual systems the same facilities and upon the same terms. The company is ordered to desist from unjust discriminations.

The same order requires that the Home Telephone and Telegraph company shall immediately remove all equipment which is designed to permit the interchange of traffic between the Home and the Pacific companies upon the premises of individual subscribers, except in certain cases, and that the company shall not install its equipment for such purposes without the consent of the Pacific company and upon the further order of the commission. The order becomes effective November 1.

It is recorded that in Yorkshir in 1502, Henry Jenkins was born. He died in 1670, cut off at the age of 169 years. He remembered well the battle of Floden Field. This occurred in 1513, when he was 12 years of age. The Register of Chancery and other courts show the administration of oaths to him 140 years prior to his death. He gave deposition as witness when he was 157. In his young manhood, when he was a little over 100, he was a remarkable swimmer.

The term "old age" too frequently is another name for the falling due of the debts of youth. Over-eating, over-drinking, over-playing, over-working, these are drafts on the bank of Nature which sooner or later must be met. Sometimes the day of reckoning can be put off a little bit, but Dame Nature will not be wheedled out of her claim.

The remarkable thing about Henry Jenkins is the fact that he has left behind him no rules of living which would enable one to duplicate his feat. "Moderation." Moderation in food, moderation in drink, moderation in joys and worries of life, moderation in work, moderation in recreation, equanimity of the mind, the soul and the body. These make for long tenure of life.
