### Merchant Ships' Flags.

The British mercantile flag is known familiarly as the red ensign. Strictly speaking, no inland person has any right to fly the red ensign ashore, the only flag permissible being the plain union jack, which the ordinary citizen often flies upside down. The red ensign has its official status from the edicts of two queens, Queen Anne in 1707 and Queen Victoria in 1804. The merchantmen of the colonies generally use the red ensign also, but by permission of the admiralty may add the badge of the colony "in the fly." Some nations have special mercantile marine flags, but not all. The United States flag, for instance, is the stars and stripes for all occasions. The German mercantile flag of black, white and red dates only from 1807 and symbolizes the union between the Hohenzollern black and white and the red and white of the Hanseatic league. The Russian mercantile flag, introduced by Peter the Great, was originally the Dutch flag, familiar to him from his studies in Holland, reversed. Later the arrangement of the three colors was varied.—London Globe
