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FAIR WILL BEGIN 10 A. M. TOMORROW

Management Declare It Will Be
Finest Display Ever Shown
Around Here.

EXHIBITS PROMISE
TO BE LARGE ONES

Many Schools in It, Big Stock
Display, Art, Flowers Culinary, Etc. Fine.

That Albany will have the best display of the products of Linn and Benton counties ever presented here is the statement of President Fisher of the fair board. Everything is working fine for the fair board except the weather. That may affect things some, but not the inside exhibits which will be large and attractive.

The school exhibit at the armory, Supt. Jackson declared this morning, will be the biggest and best ever seen in Linn county, if not in the state. During the day he has been scheming to get more room in the big armory. Each school is allowed ten feet of space, and it is all taken. Sodaville was the first to have its display installed, a good one. Each room of the schools of this city, will have a separate display, under the management of the teacher of the grade. Then the following other schools will have exhibits, covering not only school work, but agriculture, etc.: Knox Butte east, Millersburg, Dever, Davis, Grange 10, Price, Oak Creek, McFarland, Riverside, Hulbert, Oakville, Crowfoot, North Lebanon, Thomas, Mill City, Seio, Harrisburg, Halsey, Shedd, Tangent. The exhibits will be open evenings until 10, with a musical program every night.

The horses will be shown at the Palace stables on north Ferry street, with prospects of some fine animals. Cattle, hogs and sheep will be on the saleday grounds.

Manufactured articles, etc. will be shown in the different rooms of the central building. There will also be some fine community exhibits there, and Sherman and Gilkey will have big individual displays, in keeping with their coast reputations.

It is doubtful if there has ever been in the central Willamette valley a finer display of things that will benefit shown by the ladies in the different art departments in the Rhodes Annex. The exhibits in art, ladies' textiles, flowers and culinary departments, under Miss Canfield, Miss Breckenridge, Mrs. Weatherford and Mrs. Nelson, it is said will be complete, and will draw big crowds during the fair.

The fair will open at 10 a. m. tomorrow at the Central block, with music, if not too wet, but it will start then any way.

Albany people should make a special effort to attend the different exhibits and lend enthusiasm to the affair.

Arnold's fine attractions will be shown around the central building and should be given liberal patronage.

O. A. C. FRESHMEN WILL PLAY HERE SATURDAY

Albany College Is Up Against
Hard Proposition in Coming
Contest.

Feeling satisfied with their showing against Willamette University last Saturday, the Albany College football team has been hard at work this week preparing for the next game, which will be in this city Saturday afternoon with the O. A. C. freshmen. Bruised and battered by their heavier opponents, several members of the team are in poor condition and some will not be seen in the lineup this week.

Coach Bailey, while elated over the close score Saturday, and proud of the showing of his boys, is nevertheless not satisfied with the team. Gloor will be switched to full back, and French will play right half. Captain Parker is out of the game with a bad knee and his place at tackle will be filled by Martin. The absence of Jensen, a new man, who is out with a bad shoulder, will weaken the team considerably, for this lad did stalwart work against Willamette. Spear or Mickelson will take his place. At end Springer has a bad side and wrist, and his place will be taken by Shortridge, who played a smashing game against the Methodists. Coach Bailey is sweet on the little midget and will give him every opportunity to make good. He is fast and a sure tackler and gets into the play with a gritty and fearless determination that looks good to the good coach.

French will be in good shape for the fray with the O. A. C. babes, and will be found booting the spirals in the way that put fear into hearts of W. U. He outkicked his opponent over 20 yards to the punt last week. With a full line up Bailey feels that his team would have a good chance of winning Saturday, but will be perfectly well satisfied if he can hold the Aggies to as low as a 14 to 0 score.

The Freshmen have a fair fight team, made up from some of the best high school stars in the state, and will give the college plenty to do to keep the score down. The officers for the game will be announced later.

BALKAN CONFLICT GETTING WARM

Austrians in Charge Around
Belgrade, But Meeting Heavy
Resistance.

SERBIANS ARE GOING
BACK TOWARDS HILLS

Bulgaria Said to Have Formally
Declared War Against
Serbia.

Vienna, Oct. 13.—Pushing their way into Neaerast, the Austro-Germans are seeking a junction with the Bulgarians, attacking all along the Danube, to save the rivers on the Drina east bank, it is officially stated. The hills about Belgrade are in the invaders' hands. The enemy advanced only in the face of admittedly heavy resistance from comparatively few Serbians. The Austrians captured Mount Lipa, east of Belgrade. They are now advancing southward from Belgrade, while the Germans are driving the Serbians before them from Belgrade in the direction of Passarowitz.

Athens, Oct. 13.—The Serbians repulsed the Bulgarian attempt to take positions south of Salchiar, on the railroad between Nish and Prochovo.

Paris, Oct. 13.—Bulgaria declared war against Serbia on Tuesday, according to the Bucharest dispatch. Russia is preparing to land a vast army on the Bulgarian coast, according to the Roumanian Journal Universal.

Amsterdam, Oct. 11.—A new drive by the Allies at Artois in the Champagne regions and perhaps elsewhere, is momentarily expected. It is understood here that the Allies plan to keep the Kaiser too busy on the western line to push into the Balkans. Meanwhile the Serbians are being reinforced.

MERCHANT MARINE BILL OUTLINED

McAdoo Begins Campaign For
Establishment of Bigger
Naval Reserve.

GOVERNMENT TO BE
SOLE STOCKHOLDER

Auxiliary Fleet, Commercial
Relief, Non-dependence of
Capital Leading Points.

(By United Press)

Washington, Oct. 13.—The first announcement of the administration's merchant marine bill was made by Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo in a United Press interview in which he detailed the plans for building up a naval reserve to be operated through a corporation in which the government is the sole stockholder. The statement was made on the eve of his departure for a western trip in which he will speak in behalf of the measure. The chief factors were:

Necessity for an auxiliary fleet for the navy; necessity for immediate relief of American commerce; hopelessness of private capital coming promptly to the relief of American foreign trade. The fact is that the government is the only agency of sufficient strength to give quick assistance necessary. Secretary McAdoo said he hoped and believed the president will recommend the passage of this legislation the coming session of congress.

SLAVS REPORT GAINS AGAINST GERMANS IN GALICIA

Are Driving Their Enemies in
Great Disorder Petrograd
Claims.

Petrograd, Oct. 13.—With fresh supplies of munitions the Slavs have again taken the offensive, and made important gains in Galicia. Having crossed the Strypa river, they are driving the enemy before them in Galicia in great disorder, imprisoning several thousand, capturing cannon, and ammunition. Desperate fighting continues in the Dvinsk region. Occupation of "part" of the Russian trenches near Illust by the Germans is admitted in the latest war office statement.

Several years ago he left Albany, which he made his home after 1881 for a good many years, and went to Lebanon and vicinity, and other places, for several years, finally going to Gold Hill to reside with a sister. He leaves two brothers and three sisters, A. D. Barker, of Portland; Dr. E. R. Parker, of Gold Hill; Mrs. Lanham of the same place; Mrs. G. T. Cotton of Lebanon, and Mrs. C. P. Davis, of Seattle.

BOSTON WINS CHAMPIONSHIP

With Foster in the Box Again
Downs Quakers in Sensational
Finish.

BOSTON FOUR GAMES,
PHILADELPHIA ONE

Little Foster Will Go Into History
As the Hero of the
Series.

Philadelphia, Oct. 13.—Harry Hooper gave Boston another world's championship with two runs into the center field bleachers. The Californian came to bat in the ninth with the score tied four and four and sent the 1915 series into history with a terrific clout which cleared the fence on the bounce by three feet.

It was the fourth straight victory for Boston, and the third which was won in the ninth inning by one run. The Philadelphia batters lost the championship. After the poorest hitting in any world's series, the Phillies suddenly found their eyes in the last game and bombarded Foster for nine hits, including a double and a home run. Today's game was the first really championship game of the series. It was replete with dramatic moments and terrific hitting in pinches and clever fielding.

Philadelphia scored two in the first. Bancroft singled, Paskert singled, Luderus doubled, Luderus doubled, scoring both. Boston scored one in the second. Gardner tripled, scoring on Barry's single. Boston tied the score in the third. Hooper homed, Philadelphia got a home run lead in the fourth. Luderus homed, Niehoff singled, advanced on Burns' single and scored on Hooper's error. Fifth, sixth and seventh were scoreless. Boston tied it in the eighth. Gainer singled and scored when Lewis homed. Batteries: Boston, Foster and Thomas; Philadelphia, Mayer and Burns.

SUIT TO COLLECT MONEY FOR SERVICES

A complaint was filed today by H. C. Atwell to collect \$2870 from the Linnhaven Orchard Co., alleged to be due for services rendered.

According to the complaint plaintiff was employed as supervising horticulturist at a salary of \$100 per month from Feb. 1911 to the first day of February, 1912, and from February first, 1912, to June first, 1913, at \$150 per month. At odd times sums amounting to \$730 have been paid, leaving a balance of \$2870 from the \$3600 due. Wm. G. Hare and Hill & Marks are attorneys for plaintiff.
