FAVORABLE GAME LEGISLATION DURING THE PAST YEAR

Deer Hunting in Only 36 States; Several Limit the Number to One.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 20.—Legislation to protect the game of the country has been enacted during 1915, and a summary is included in Farmers' Bulletin 692.

In nine states changes bring the closed seasons in the states for migratory birds into harmony with the federal regulations. A limit on the number of waterfowl a sportsman may shoot in a day was fixed in Arkansas and Connecticut. Most states fix a limit of 25 or less per day. All but 14 of the states which permit quail hunting now have a limit of 20.

Big game has received additional protection in many states. Hunting mountain sheep has been suspended in Idaho, Montana, and Washington, and in Montana goats as well are protected until 1918. Maine moose may not be shot for four years. This is the first absolutely closed season for moose since 1880. In Wyoming moose hunting is permitted for the first time in 12 years, allowing the killing of 50 bull moose under \$100 licenses.

Deer hunting is permitted in 36 states, in one-third of which the hunter is limited to one deer a season; in most of the others to two. Seventeen states protect at all seasons, and a number require that only those deer may be killed which have horns of definite length. Prairie chicken shooting is permitted in Indiana, for the first time since 1907. Indiana, however, prohibits the use of artificial lights attached to automobiles for hunting game on or near a highway. Partridge hunters in Michigan also are prohibited from using automobiles.

Rebekah Convention.

Roseburg, Or., Oct. 20.—The annual district convention of the Rebekah lodges of Canyonville, Riddle, Myrtle Creek, Roseburg, Sutherlin, Oakland and Yoncalla, was meeting here today. Mrs. C. L. Palmer, president of the Rebekah assembly of Oregon, occupied the chair. The degree work by the Sutherlin lodge created much favorable comment.

Rev. Coke Bilyeu Now.

The ministerial certificate of Coke I. Bilyeu, of Eugene, was filed with the county clerk yesterday. The certificate, which has been issued by the union church which conducts services in the Dunn school house south of Eugene, states that the congregation voted on October 17 to recognize Mr. Bilyeu as a minister of the gospel, and to license him to preach and to perform the duties usually devolving upon a minister.—Eugene Register.
