TIDE RISING.

Here is the best report for a long time from Dun:

With cross currents diminishing in force, the tide of business is rising at an accelerated pace and an era of widespread activity is in prospect. Usually during a transition period gains are recorded slowly, but strictly mercantile conditions have passed the stage where progress is difficult of discernment, and of late industrial expansion has been phenomenally rapid.

Reports from nearly all sections of the country tell of the unchecked growth of new enterprise, which, while manifest in varying degrees in different lines and localities, is everywhere stimulated by the exceptional strength of the fundamental situation. Assurance of agricultural success, together with the most unlimited financial resources, has given the commercial world the confidence essential to the development of national prosperity, and the notable improvement in sentiment and change of spirit, is now more clearly reflected in the volume of current transactions.

The latter, with few exceptions, are steadily enlarging, as is evidenced by the comparisons of bank clearings, railroad earnings, commodity prices, unfilled steel tonnage, idle freight cars and other statistical barometers. It is not mere speculation or hope that starts many wheels revolving in iron and steel after an idleness of several years, but a rush of actual orders that is taxing the capacity of mills and furnaces to the utmost.

With operations in the great basic industry on a scale seldom, if ever, equalled, additions to working forces are imperative and the increase in the number of men at work means a broadening of consumptive requirements. This puts more money in circulation and ultimately benefits all branches of business, causing dealers to replenish depleted stocks, making collections more prompt and thus lowering the commercial death rate.

Retail trade the last step in the movement from producer to consumer, is further stimulated by reasonable weather and in some directions distribution of fall merchandise is exceeding expectations. This is particularly true of footwear and wearing apparel in general; domestic buying of leather is also appreciably larger, and foreign contracts continue a feature, while more customers have appeared in the dry goods markets and future needs are anticipated with greater freedom.

Although in most quarters the trend of quotations is distinctly upward, in many cases advanced wage schedules offset the enhanced cost of commodities. In the adjustment to new economic conditions signs are to be expected, and for some time to come the situation in different sections and trades is likely to vary considerably. It is apparent, however, that strictly home demands are becoming more of a factor in promoting current progress, which, while the direct outgrowth of the war, rests upon the solid foundation of agricultural prosperity and an exceptionally strong banking position.
