THE LATE DEPRESSION.

Journal: Cheer up, ye pessimists—Martin Geary is home.

Geary has not reason to be an optimist, because he works for the Rock Island railroad. But when he got back early today from the annual convention of the National Association of Traveling Passenger Agents, the sun came out.

"Business is so much better all through the east that nobody will stand for even a discussion of the late depression," said Geary today. "And it isn't altogether the munition makers that are feeling it. Everybody. Big crops, domestic demands, heavy buying by the railroads are some of the causes. Over in Canada the same condition exists, save that there they are paying more attention to the war. You just watch—things will be normal right around here before you know it."

Geary delivered one of the two principal addresses before the passenger men's convention at Boston, discussing the relation of the ticket clerk to the public.

LIVING FOR PLEASURE.

"I am the youngest child, and with the lesson of my parents before me, I will learn to build my house, while I yet have time, on a rock foundation."
