PORTLAND AND VALLEY.

Portland and the Willamette Valley should be like two brothers, with interests in the same field. They are one, and should be treated as such by the people of both Portland and the valley. Whatever helps one helps the other. The growth and progress of Portland is a big thing for the valley and the prosperity of the valley means much in the commercial health of the metropolis. There should be no pulling and hauling between the two. Just now there is a big matter up of much concern. It is that of timber rates to be settled by the interstate commission on Nov. 19. Instead of seeking an advantage the effort should be made to secure a rate that shall be equal for both, putting them on an even plane, making whatever competition there is along other lines than locality. Along the lumber line particularly there should be an even break for the valley, for just now the industry is having a hard row to saw, and deserves all the help that can be given it. Capital for investment in the business should be encouraged, not discouraged. Nothing will do more to advance the demand for more railroads than the promotion of the lumber business, and a big factor in the business is equitable freight rates. The movement in Portland now is to give that city an advantage. This should not be. Instead, the movement there as well as in the valley should be to place both on the same footing, after considering all the issues in connection with the matter, such as competing water traffic, etc.
