University of Oregon, Eugene, Oct. 28.—Linn county has fourteen students at the state university this year, according to a report recently issued from Registrar A. R. Tiffany's office. They are: Paul Baker, Ralph Boyd, Bess Cushman and Lela Cushman; Elva Estes and Goldie Wells, of Halsey; George Guldager and Russell Quisenberry, of Harrisburg; Orville Monteith, Rolla Ralston, Kenneth Stevens and Marshall Woodworth, of Albany.

Linn county students are doing their share in student activities and enterprises. Prentiss Brown, president of the Junior class last year, is prominent in debating circles; Orville Monteith is a regular on Coach Bezdek's football team and Kenneth Stevens is a member of the Varsity band.

This year's registration shows an increase of ten per cent over the enrollment at the corresponding time last year. This increase is due in part to the spread of higher education throughout the state and to the growth of the University which has diverted considerably the flow to other institutions outside of Oregon.

15 YEARS FOR BEING DRUNK.

Man at Salem Got Drunk and was Put in the Penitentiary for Offense.

Salem Journal: A sentence of 15 years in the Oregon state pen on a single charge of being intoxicated is the longest on record but such was what happened to Dr. D. E. Ehmer this morning and the prisoner is now serving his long sentence. Ehmer was sent up from Baker county three years ago on a forgery charge and received a sentence of from two to 20 years in the pen. After serving two years as a model prisoner Ehmer was credited with five years time and was released last spring from the pen and secured a job in this city.

He was up in police court once before but Parole Officer Keller let him go on his promise to be good in the future. Last night Ehmer was picked up by the officers on a drunk charge and today he was taken back to the pen to serve out the remainder of his sentence.

Must School Boys Wear Collars? (By United Press)

Trenton, N. J., Oct. 27.—May a schoolboy attend classes in summer without a collar and in winter sit muffled in a sweater if he so chooses, or has a teacher the authority to dictate the attire of the pupils? This is the question that is expected to be decided by the State Commissioner

of Education Calvin M. Kendall today.

The Merchantville board of education has decided in favor of the teacher. It denied the petition of Frank V. L. Turner and his wife to dress their children as they saw fit. They were sent home because they didn't wear collars.

Anniversary of White Plains.

White Plains, N. Y., Oct. 28.—White Plains is to celebrate today the anniversary of the battle of White Plains. Arrangements have been completed for the unveiling of a battle monument on Battle Hill. It will be followed by parades, dinner and speeches, and to top the celebration there is to be a big dance.

The monument is a reproduction of the gun carriage on the battleship Maline and will be surmounted by one of the cannon from the warship. It will bear this inscription: From the U. S. S. Maine; marks the hill where Battle of White Plains was fought, Oct. 28, 1776. Erected by the White Plains Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution, Oct. 28, 1913.

PORTLAND WEEKLY STOCK MARKET REPORT

Portland, Oct. 25.—With a medium sized run of 1050 head of cattle, the market opened with steers stronger; although the prices obtained did not reach the last week's top, the class of stuff offered was not as good but brought better prices than the same class of stuff offered last week. Cows brought \$2.25, bulls \$5.

Hogs—A good run of 4800 head opened with steady prices which were maintained at the close. The bulk of hogs went over the scales at 7c and one load at \$7.10. Outlook good with demand fair.

Sheep—A comparatively small handful of sheep came forward over Sunday. Scarcity of sheep forced the buyer's hand for a little more money, and prime lambs brought \$7.35 with ewes bringing \$5.50 and wethers \$6. More good lambs could be handled very nicely by the packers two or three weeks.
