Pineapples Cheap—

Owing to the conditions brought on by the war in Europe the Hawaiian pineapple market is in a very bad way this year. The marketing division of one of the express companies has undertaken to help the distribution of the product, and manager Small, of the local office is in receipt of literature and instructions regarding prices, etc. By ordering this delicious fruit direct from the express company in San Francisco it is possible to get pineapples such as were never seen here before. The average commercial pineapple weighs from two to five pounds, but in the present instance this class ranges from three to seven. The express company has arranged to ship in cartons one or four pineapples, weighing from 8 to 10 pounds each. The price is three cents per pound and the express on four p. a. s. would be about seventy-five cents, making four luscious pieces of fruit weighing 40 pounds cost about \$2. Pineapples in the local market usually sell for

around fifteen cents per pound.

WILL VOTE ON SUFFRAGE IN THREE STATES TOMORROW

New York, Nov. 1.—With the voters of three of the big Eastern states casting their ballots tomorrow on the question of giving the ballot to women, interest among women of the East centers on the big campaign closing tonight. In Massachusetts, New York and Pennsylvania extensive campaigns have been conducted, and the women have had the center of the stage, the great political issue being minus this year. Although the hopes of the campaigners were dashed by the New Jersey defeat, there is still a reasonable likelihood that at least one of the states will grant the vote to women tomorrow. Pennsylvania is picked as the likeliest field of victory. New York has not opened up its heart to the women's cause, and it is reported that the old parties have cast buckets of cold water on the suffrage movement. There is another bright spot on the election map for women tomorrow, for Detroit women over 21 who own real estate are eligible to vote on questions of purchasing the big street railway. The state constitution in Michigan grants the vote to women on questions of acquiring a public utility or granting a franchise.

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BIRTHDAY OF GOVERNOR GEO. W. P. HUNT OF ARIZONA

Governor George W. Hunt, of Arizona, the first chief executive of the newest state in the Union, and once a cow-puncher, is 56 years old today. He is one of the most active executives in the southwest. A year ago he waged a lonely fight to eliminate capital punishment in Arizona. It was his pet measure, and it was defeated. He had long been interested in prison reform, for it is his principle to build up men rather than kill them. His experience from ranchman to governor had confirmed his views and intensified them, and he is still on the job working out reforms and heading uplift work. He has recently passed through a troublesome period along his border with Mexico. To stop the inroads of bandits, he sought permission of the federal government to send rangers into Mexico to arrest offenders. He believes a state afflicted by murderous neighbors should have the right of self-protection. Governor Hunt was born at Huntsville, Mo., Nov. 1, 1859. He went into Arizona when he was a young man, and ranched on the Salt River. He later opened a store and engaged in trading. His political career began in 1893, when he was sent to the legislature. He served in both houses, and served as president of the convention that drafted the Arizona constitution. In 1911 he was elected the first governor of the new state, and was re-elected last fall by a handsome majority.

Champion Layer.
Philadelphia, Oct. 31.—With a record of 314 eggs in 363 days, Lady Egline, a White Leghorn pullet, today became the champion egg-layer of the world.

The little hen, weighing three and a half pounds, completed her year egg-laying competition at Delaware College, Newark, Del., and beat the previous record of 301 eggs by 13.

The "previous world's record for a year's laying was held by Lady MacDuff, an Oregon Agricultural College hen, which last year completed a score of 301 eggs in 365 days. Another Oregon Agricultural College hen has just completed a year's record of 300 eggs.
