SUNDAY LAW BRINGS UP MANY QUESTIONS

The district attorney's and sheriff's offices were besieged yesterday with dozens of inquiries from people with regard to the Sunday closing law. The law is very indefinite with regard to the selling of food stuffs and other forms of goods in restaurants, cigar stores and goods not classed as drugs in drug stores, and other articles in places that are exempt from the closing act.

No information could be given the questioners for it will take a court decision to settle the matter and all were told that they would have to use their own judgment and run the chances if they keep open. The law was passed in 1864 and has never been in force and no opinions as to the exact meaning of the act have ever been handed down in court.
