THE PLOT LEADEREvidence Shows Him to Be Per-
sonal-non-Grata with the
Administration.NUBER MAY BE
INVITED TO GODepartment Is Probing Recent
Bomb Explosion and
Munition Fires.

Washington, Nov. 13.—Evidence obtained by the state department concerning the activities of the Austrian consul general Nuber, of New York as leader of the alleged anti-American plottings has made him personal-non-grata with the administration. The decision as to what will be done with him lies with Secretary Lansing. These facts were developed in the wake of disclosures by former Austrian Consul Gorikar, that the spy system is fostered in this country by Nuber and Von Bernstorff; and the announcement that the department of justice is probing the recent suspicious bomb explosions and fires of American munitions plants. If Secretary Lansing takes the step he is reported to believe warranted by the evidence, he will revoke Nuber's exequaturs and terminate his official status.

ALBANY BATTLING SALEM
FOR VALLEY CHAMPIONSHIPDetermined Struggle Is Being
Waged in Salem by Two
Old Rivals.

The Game.
First quarter. Salem first 0
touchdown after 10 minutes' play.

This afternoon on Willamette field in Salem Albany and Salem high schools are engaged in one of the greatest struggles in the history of the two schools. With both teams evenly matched the fight will be to a finish. The team, with Coach Stevenson, the Albany high school band and over 100 rooters, left for Salem at 12:45 on an Oregon Electric special. The game was called at 1:30 by Referee "Pete" Anderson, of the O. A. C. The umpire will be Emil Houser, the former Carlisle Indian star, who is now at Chemawa, and who formerly wore an O. A. C. uniform a couple of years ago. Many members of the O. A. C. team, especially those who formerly played on Albany high will see the game.

Salem has made great preparations for the game and is determined to win. Yesterday a special edition of the Clarion, the school paper, was published, and after school a special meeting of the student body was called. In the evening a big rally was called off and as the rooters followed the members of the team down the street they were headed by a float on which were two slabs and a fresh mound of earth supposed to represent all that remained of Albany. Fully 2000 people are at the game.

VERDICT OF \$2800 AGAINST
THE HAZLEWOOD CREAMERYAlbany Lawyers Win Damage
Suit for Breach of Lease Con-
tract Made by Portland Co.

C. E. Sox, of Hewitt & Sox, returned from Portland last night, having been there to conduct the case of the First National Bank against the Hazlewood Co. The suit was one for damages for breach of contract. The First National Bank, which owned the creamery on East Fifth street leased the property to the Hazlewood company, with an agreement that the old route was to be kept up with other conditions. The company instead of using the property gave it up and moved down on Second street, near the Burggraf block, abandoning the butter making plant. The case was warmly contested, resulting in a verdict yesterday of \$2,800 for the plaintiff.

German Munitions Did It.

AUSTRO-GERMANS
ON THE DEFENSEThus Declares a Report from
London Indicating Russian
Offensive.TROOPS SAID TO BE
WITHDRAWN FOR BALKANSSerbian Army Reported Fleeing
On Way Losing Eleven
Hundred Prisoners.

London, Nov. 13.—Once advancing victoriously, the Austro-Germans along the eastern front are now on the defense, losing here and there. The Russians dealt them heavy attacks at Riga, Dvinsk and Volhynia regions. The gradual collapse of the Germans is attributed to the withdrawal for the Balkan campaign, or possibly to inadequate munitions.

Berlin, Nov. 13.—Crossing the Jasteriac range, 20 miles southeast of Krusevac, the Austro-German soldiers joined the Bulgars in pursuit of the main fleeing Serbian army and captured over 1100 prisoners, it is officially announced.

Where Is E20.

London, Nov. 13.—The British submarine E 20, missing a month is probably lost, the admiralty admitted. The last news from her was that she was in the Sea of Marmora.

Berlin, Nov. 13.—The British submarine E20 reported by London as "probably lost" sunk November 5 in the Dardanelles, the Constantinople admiralty announced officially. Three submarine officers, and six of her men were captured. The submarine was one of England's most modern boats.

Another Escapes.

Washington, Nov. 13.—Because still another interned German at Norfolk has escaped, Secretary Daniels has asked Secretary Lansing whether it will be permissible hereafter for United States marines guarding interned raiders to fire at any sailor trying to escape.

SWEEPING INVESTIGATION OF

U. S. GOVERNMENT OUT
OF CASE AGAINST ROBERTS
