DANGER OF BOOM.

A Minneapolis paper is considerably worried over the prospect of a great boom all over the country, now in full swing in the east, and says:

The revival of commerce and industry in every part of the United States east of the Rocky Mountains has come with such a rush that the public hardly appreciates it. It is a matter of course that grain shipments through Minneapolis break the record and that our flour mills have been running day and night for two months. But the rest of the country is not far behind us now, and munitions of war as yet make only a moderate part of the business. The reaction upon domestic industry and transportation stirs the country. The steel mills are gorged with orders that have little to do with munitions of war. Production of construction steel, rails and transportation equipment rivals that of shells and gun forgings, and such orders are more readily accepted by mills not overworked. The war orders fill a larger portion of space in the newspapers than in the mills.

KILLED IN A TRENCH.

A dispatch from Paris says: "Johnny Poe, the former Princeton football man, was killed recently charging a German trench, somewhere in Northern France." In the eyes of Princeton he was the greatest Poe who ever lived; but he was little in a trench no more than a common laborer. But what was Poe, an American, doing in a war trench? Was he tired of life and wanted to take this method of leaving this rough old world? Taking part in an unnecessary and an unrighteous war by an American suggests pity.

A TIRESOME SUBJECT.

In Holland the people are so tired of the war, with which they have nothing to do except as neutrals, that they have gotten out some buttons which when translated, read: "Do not chin me about the war." They had rather talk about something else there. So had a great many people in this country.

THIRD FOR LIQUOR.

A professor in the seminary of Waymouth gives the following startling facts:

In this it is affirmed that the annual income of the four million people of Ireland is approximately \$40,000,000. Of this \$13,500,000 is spent for alcoholic drinks! This is over one-third of the Irish people's spending capacity. * * * Of the 29,281 persons committed in one year to Irish prisons, 10,092 were sent up for drunkenness. Ireland supports in its 138 workhouses 38,000 paupers and an army of officials to look after them. Then there are the immense lunatic asylums, the inmates of which are in the major number of cases, interned because of alcohol, directly or indirectly.

BLUE OVERALLS DOOMED.

An interesting feature of the war is that our men may have to wear overalls of some other color than blue which has characterized them for years. Germany is the great blue dye producer, and Germany has quit sending the stuff to America, in fact cannot. Any other color will do as well. Brown, grey, almost any color. The United States should arise to the occasion and make any kind of dye stuffs needed. We have led the world along a good many lines, why not in dye stuffs?

Advertisement for Sewer Construction

Sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:00 p. m., November 24, 1915, for the construction of the following lateral sewer tributary to the Cottage Street trunk sewer, all within the City of Albany, Oregon, to-wit:

No. 1. Beginning at the Cottage Street trunk sewer manhole between Seventh and Eighth Streets and running thence easterly through the center of Block 3 of City View Addition and through the center of Block 1 of Mountain View Addition, a distance of 336 feet.

No. 2. Beginning at the Cottage Street trunk sewer manhole between Eighth and Ninth Streets and running thence easterly through the center of Block 4 of City View Addition and through the center of Block 2 of Mountain View Addition, a distance of 336 feet.

No. 3. Beginning at the Cottage Street trunk sewer manhole between Ninth and Tenth Streets and running thence easterly through the center of Block 11 of City View Addition, through the center of Block 3 of Mountain View Addition, through the center of Block 6 of Wright's Addition, across Willetta Street and through the center of Block 1 of Wright's Addition, a distance of 804 feet.

No. 4.—Beginning at the Cottage Street trunk sewer manhole between Tenth and Eleventh Streets and running thence easterly through the center of Block 12 of City View Addition, through the center of Block 4 of Mountain View Addition, through the center of Block 5 of Wright's Addition, across Willetta Street and through the center of Block 2 of Wright's Addition, a distance of 804 feet.

No. 5.—Beginning at the Cottage Street trunk sewer manhole between Eleventh and Twelfth Streets and running thence easterly through the center of Block 19 of City View Addition, through the center of Block 5 of Mountain View Addition, through the center of Block 4 of Wright's Addition, across Willetta Street and through the center of Block 3 of Wright's Addition, a distance of 804 feet, also beginning at a manhole in said lateral sewer in Willetta Street and running thence southerly along Willetta Street, across Twelfth Street and to the center of Block 2 of Menonite Church Addition, a distance of 270 feet, thence easterly along the center line of Blocks 2 and 1 of Menonite Church Addition, a distance of 267 feet.

No. 6. Beginning at the Cottage Street trunk sewer manhole between Twelfth and Kalamath Sts. and running thence easterly along the north boundary line of Linnmont Addition a distance of 500 feet.
 No. 7. Beginning at the Cottage Street trunk sewer manhole between

Seventh and Eighth Streets and running thence westerly through the center of Block 2 of City View Addition, across Liberty Street and through the center of Block 1 of City View Addition, a distance of 414 feet.
 No. 8. Beginning at the Cottage Street trunk sewer manhole between Eighth and Ninth Streets and running thence westerly along the center line of Block 5, across Liberty Street, through the center of Block 6, across West Street and through the center of Block 7, all in City View Addition, a distance of 958 feet.
 No. 9. Beginning at the Cottage Street trunk sewer manhole between Ninth and Tenth Streets and running thence westerly through the center of Block 10 of City View Addition, a distance of 282 feet.
 No. 10. Beginning at the Cottage Street trunk sewer manhole between Tenth and Eleventh Streets and running thence westerly through the center of Block 13 of City View Addition, a distance of 282 feet.

Said sewer construction to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the City of Albany and the plans, specification and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Recorder, where plans may be seen and specification and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 7:30 o'clock p. m. November 24, 1915.
 No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in a sum equal to fifty per cent of the amount to be paid under such contract for the faithful performance of said contract.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said sewers prior to the 1st day of April, 1916, under a liquidated penalty of \$10.00 for each day of delay beyond that period. Bids will be received for either the whole of said improvements or any of said laterals separately.
