TEACHERS' WAGES.

A law passed by the legislature pro-
vides that men and women, teachers
in the public schools, shall receive
the same wages for the same services.
The statute is very plain and there is
no question about its meaning. So
far the law has been ignored gener-
ally through the state, the reason given
being that the tax levy had already
been made when it went into effect.

On Tuesday of next week meetings
will be held to vote taxes for the
support of schools for the coming
year. There should be provision
made for carrying out the terms of
the law, both here and elsewhere.
It is possible that this is being done.
It means a readjustment of matters,
the raising of the wages of female
teachers in a like service, or the low-
ering of the wages of male teachers
to meet those of the female teachers,
something to be adjusted by school
boards. As it is the male teachers
are getting none too much, and it is
well known that the teachers of Linn
county receive about the smallest
average pay of any in the state. Our
people never question the tax levy for
school purposes. They are glad to
give for the cause of education.

McCALL'S ELECTION.

The reason for the election of Mc-
Call for governor of Massachusetts
by the Republicans over Governor
Walsh, the Democratic candidate, at
the late election is fully disclosed in
a recent dispatch sent from Boston
to the New Republic, a paper pub-
lished at Westerville, Ohio, in the
interest of the Anti-Saloon League.
The dispatch recites that an unex-
pected hot campaign has suddenly
opened up in Boston to make that city
dry. The dispatch says: "Never be-
fore in its history has Boston faced
such a situation. Temperance activ-
ity is stimulated by the recent defeat
of Governor Walsh by the liquor in-
terests." Here then is the voting
power that defeated Walsh, the Dem-
ocratic candidate for governor and
elected McCall, the Republican
candidate, by an insignificant majority
of 4,000. It is this majority that the
Oregonian declares shows that the
Oregonian declares shows that the
Republicans will win next year. Vain
hope. Does the Oregonian suppose
for a moment that sincere temperance
Republicans are proud of such a vic-
tory? If the Republican party is to
depend upon the "liquor interests" to
secure the election of their candidate
for president they will have a bruised
reel to depend upon.

MONEY FOR GOOD ROADS.

The Democrat has received a copy
of the annual review of the Tri-State
Good Roads Association, Washing-
ton, Oregon and California, a well
gotten up affair. A glance at it is
an enthraller for good roads all along
the Pacific Coast. A table is given
showing the expenditures of the dif-
ferent counties of Oregon for a year
for roads and highways. Linn county
is credited with \$152,806.80, and
the per capita is given as \$5.95. Thir-
teen states have a larger per capita.
Columbia leads with \$34.35. Clatsop
is next with \$28.23. The least of any
county in the state is Yamhill, with
99 cents. The average per capita is
\$5.95, which is also Linn county's.
Four counties have bond issues for
roads. Clatsop, \$390,000; Columbia
\$360,000; Jackson, \$500,000; Hood
River, \$50,000. In total amount, re-
gardless of per Multnomah leads
with Clatsop second and Jackson
third. Linn is tenth. Between the
lines there are problems for study.

of land and employees soldiering their
time, the state was compelled to buy
practically all the garden produce it

spending their time in hatching up
devilment, should be set to work in
clearing this land and preparing it for
different crops.

Sealed bids will be received by the
Council of the City of Albany, Oregon,
until 7:30 p. m., November 24,
1915, for the construction of the fol-
lowing lateral sewers tributary to the
Cottage Street trunk sewer, all within
the City of Albany, Oregon, to-wit:

No. 1. Beginning at the Cottage
Street trunk sewer manhole between
Seventh and Eighth Streets and run-
ning thence easterly through the cen-
ter of Block 3 of City View Addition
and through the center of Block 1 of
Mountain View Addition, a distance
of 335 feet.

No. 2. Beginning at the Cottage
Street trunk sewer manhole between
Tenth and Eleventh Streets and run-
ning thence easterly through the cen-
ter of Block 4 of City View Addition
and through the center of Block 2 of
Mountain View Addition, a distance
of 336 feet.

No. 3. Beginning at the Cottage
Street trunk sewer manhole between
Ninth and Tenth Streets and run-
ning thence easterly through the cen-
ter of Block 11 of City View Addition,
through the center of Block 3 of
Mountain View Addition, through the
center of Block 6 of Wright's Addi-
tion, across Willetta Street and
through the center of Block 1 of
Wright's Addition, a distance of 804
feet.

No. 4. Beginning at the Cottage
Street trunk sewer manhole between
Tenth and Eleventh Streets and run-
ning thence easterly through the cen-
ter of Block 12 of City View Addi-
tion, through the center of Block 4
of Mountain View Addition, through
the center of Block 5 of Wright's ad-
dition, across Willetta Street and
through the center of Block 2 of
Wright's addition, a distance of 894
feet.

No. 5. Beginning at the Cottage
Street trunk sewer manhole between
Eleventh and Twelfth Streets and
running thence easterly through the
center of Block 19 of City View Ad-
dition, through the center of Block 5
of Mountain View Addition, through
the center of Block 4 of Wright's Ad-
dition, across Willetta Street and
through the center of Block 3 of
Wright's Addition, a distance of 804
feet, also beginning at a manhole in
said lateral sewer in Willetta Street
and running thence southerly along
Willetta Street, across Twelfth Street
and to the center of Block 2 of Men-
monite Church Addition, a distance of
270 feet, thence easterly along the
center line of Blocks 2 and 1 of Men-
monite Church Addition, a distance
of 267 feet.

No. 6. Beginning at the Cottage
Street trunk sewer manhole between
Twelfth and Kalamath Sts. and run-
ning thence easterly along the north
boundary line of Linnmont Addition
a distance of 500 feet.

No. 7. Beginning at the Cottage
Street trunk sewer manhole between
Seventh and Eighth Streets and run-
ning thence westerly through the
center of Block 2 of City View Addi-
tion, across Liberty Street and
through the center of Block 1 of City
View Addition, a distance of 414 feet.

No. 8. Beginning at the Cottage
Street trunk sewer manhole between
Eighth and Ninth Streets and running
thence westerly along the center line
of Block 5, across Liberty Street,
through the center of Block 6, across
West Street and through the center
of Block 7, all in City View Addition,
a distance of 958 feet.

No. 9. Beginning at the Cottage
Street trunk sewer manhole between

Ninth and Tenth Streets and running
thence westerly through the center
of Block 10 of City View Addition
a distance of 282 feet.

No. 10. Beginning at the Cottage
Street trunk sewer manhole between
Tenth and Eleventh Streets and run-
ning thence westerly through the cen-
ter of Block 13 of City View Addi-
tion, a distance of 282 feet.

Said sewer construction to be made
in accordance with the charter and
ordinances of the City of Albany and
the plans, specifications and estimates
of the City Engineer on file in the
office of the Recorder, where plans
may be seen and specification and es-
timates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 7:30 o'clock
p. m. November 24, 1915.

No proposal or bid will be consid-
ered unless accompanied by a certi-
fied check payable to the City of Al-
bany in an amount equal to five per
cent of the aggregate bid to be for-
feited as fixed and liquidated damages
in case the bidder neglects or refuses
to enter into a contract and provide
an approved bond in a sum equal to
fifty per cent of the amount to be paid
under such contract for the faithful
performance of said contract.

All bids must be made with a view
of completing the construction of said
sewers prior to the last day of April,
1916, under a liquidated penalty of
\$10.00 for each day of delay beyond
that period. Bids will be received for
either the whole of said improvements
or any of said laterals separately.
