TREAT CAPITAL FAIRLY.

The fact is being appreciated that if you would have capital do something for you must on your part do something for capital. In other words the two must work together. Labor should not be an enemy of capital, and cannot afford to be, because it is capital that furnishes the labor a fact that is appreciated during times of depression. It is the business of capital to treat labor fairly and squarely, because labor is what keeps capital in circulation, giving it growth. Just now a great need in Oregon is more capital in circulation, and, if we would have it circulate we must deal fairly with it. Whenever a state makes it hard for capital to pay a fair dividend there is going to be lethargy in development proceedings. There is just simply one fair way, and that is to treat taxpayers alike whether individuals or corporations, making it as easy as possible for both. There is a big movement at the present time in the state for lower taxes. This should mean that all may progress together.

RABBI WISE SAID.

In an address in Portland recently Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, of New York said:

"I am sorry for the position taken by President Wilson in the movement for military preparedness."

"I am sorry, because we have found him a wise and conservative leader heretofore, and in taking a position in favor of assuming the burden of vast military preparation for the United States, he is bound to be followed by thousands who have regarded his leadership as wise and prudent in the past."

"The whole world has gone mad since two years ago, and it is this madness that is driving the people of the United States into the present attitude which clamors for the assumption of a military burden."

"If the United States inaugurates a campaign of military preparedness at this time, upon her will be the shame of forcing upon the world a continuation of the intolerable burdens of taxation needed to maintain large military organizations, which have been proved, in the present case to be not a means of preventing war, but a sure way of producing it."

"Other nations emerging from the struggle across the ocean will see that the United States is building a second navy and quadrupling her army over that of four years ago, and they will feel themselves obliged also to continue in the competition of armaments."

CARNEGIE HEROES.

In the current issue of Farm and Fireside is an interesting article on the medal winners of the Carnegie hero fund.

"Since the Carnegie Hero Fund was established," we read, "medals have been awarded to eighty-nine farmers for deeds of bravery. Seventy-eight railroad men—including conductors, brakemen, engineers, switchmen, flagmen, yardmen, and all branches of the trade—have been decorated, while the count for miners—engaged in one of the most hazardous of all employments—is but sixty-five, and for those who follow the sea—including fishermen, sailors, deck hands, and so on—is but forty-seven. No other calling has made nearly so good a showing as farming."

"The surprising things which the record disclose is that many of the farmer heroes are boys."
