## FINANCIAL STABILITY.

A sweeping declaration of American financial stability was made by Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo in his annual report to congress today.

"Our financial resources are the greatest in our history and our banking system, through the operation of the federal reserve system is the strongest in the world," he said.

Commenting on business conditions the secretary declared one of the most encouraging features was that the demand for iron and steel products is heavier from domestic than from foreign sources.

Among recommendations made is one that persons having a gross income of \$3,000 or more a year shall pay an income tax. The law at present provides for net incomes of that amount, leaving it to the individual to determine whether his net income is \$3,000 or more. The report does not mention other income tax law changes suggested by the secretary in a recent statement.

Indicating the fight to be made on the so-called pork measure, the secretary advances arguments for its discontinuance. He cites bad public building conditions in many cities.

He supports the idea of government treatment of drug addicts by the public health service or other government agency, and suggests that the Harrison narcotic act be made more stringent.

Concerning the public health service, the secretary urges upon congress the necessity for more commissioned medical officers and larger public health field investigation. He points out that the United States is the only country which does not provide for the isolation and care of lepers. There are approximately 146 lepers in the U. S., he states, and congress is urged to pass a bill introduced at the last congress, for a national leprosy hospital.

Plans are being worked out by the Coast Guard and Navy, the Secretary says, to make the former organization a valuable auxiliary to the navy in time of war.

The secretary also calls attention to the saving effected by the treasury's innovation of shipping money by parcel post rather than express. He recommends increasing the salaries of assistant secretaries from \$5000 to \$7500. The present salary, the secretary points out, makes it necessary for men of the calibre desired, to sacrifice themselves financially to hold the position.

## WOMAN SUFFRAGISTS ACTIVE.

At Opening of Congress Large Numbers Present and Give Parade to White House.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 6.—With the opening of congress today noon, suffrage workers made the capital city the field of their activities in behalf of the Susan B. Anthony suffrage amendment to the constitution, and at 12:30 p. m., a great delegation of suffragists was welcomed in the rotunda of the capitol by the house and senate committees on suffrage, led by Senator Sutherland and Representative Mondell.

At 2 p. m. President Wilson received 300 suffrage leaders in the East room at the White House. The campaign for the Anthony amendment will be planned at the week's session of the advisory council and senate voters' convention beginning Wednesday.

Today's receptions marked the arrival in Washington of Mrs. Sara Bard Field and Miss Frances Joliffe, from San Francisco by motor, bearing the 500,000 signature petition asking congress to pass the suffrage amendment. The two were met by representatives from Congressional Union headquarters and local suffragists in cavalry, infantry and motor divisions. The procession went to the East steps of the capitol, Senator Sutherland and Representative Mondell there received the petitions and spoke briefly. The two women travelers replied.

The suffragists then marched up Pennsylvania avenue to the White House, where only the leaders were received by the President. The president was told of the petition to congress and that the suffrage workers want the Democratic party to make an issue of suffrage.

## ARE MEN AT 60 SILLY?

Man Gives Up \$30,000 Job Declaring That Old Men are Foolish and Irritable.

Binghamton, N. Y., Dec. 2.—Lamont M. Bowers until recently manager of the Colorado Fuel and Iron company, announced today that he will resign on January 1, a \$30,000 post with the Rockefeller interests because he believes that men past 60 are "either foolish or irritable." Mr.

Bowers is past 70. His decision to retire was in spite of a letter from J. D. Rockefeller, Jr., asking him to remain in his position, which embraced a general oversight of many of the Rockefeller interests.

"To me there is nothing more to be avoided in old men than the notion that they are young and brisk and bright at 60 or 70 as they ever were," he said. "Men of that age often make big fools of themselves outside of business. They will learn to run automobiles and go scotching at a 40-mile clip, taking chances younger men would avoid. They will learn to dance and tango and wedge themselves in among young people who tolerate them because of consideration for their age or money. Old men are generally silly or irritable, and the Lord preserve me from being silly."
