A GREAT STUDY.

We stand at the door of a broadened national life, says an exchange.

In the ruins of a world's war, routes of trade, systems of credits, interchanges of commerce, all the machinery by which the world has done its business has been set out of plumb. Ordinarily, the Panama Canal would have exacted a readjustment of the ocean lanes of commerce, but this cataclysm of life and industry abroad has precipitated such an utter disruption of relations among nations that no one knows what the world's next commercial map will be.

These troublesome days of reconstruction and rehabilitation of the earth's affairs will soon be at hand. Perhaps only the growing restlessness of those immense millions in the Orient may be said to herald a new era of world peace. This period will, above all national undertakings, test the commercial future of America, its institutions and its men.

As a nation we have maintained under difficulties, a stable equilibrium. We have swiftly altered our national aims to meet, with courteous consideration, each rising international exigency. Our national life has remained undisturbed. We have upheld our traditions. The picture the future unfolds is a glorious vista of years of prosperity which no force on earth can halt.

It would, therefore, seem to be the duty of Americans to stand back of every bona fide movement calculated to optimize trade conditions and uphold courage in American business.

The electrical industry will be proud of its getting the prosperity train back on the track, for it luried its attack against pessimism months ago when depression rested heavily over the land. Cooperation has been the chief factor of the campaign, and it is the mainspring of the growth of every trade. The electrical industry, from the smallest shopkeeper to the presidents of the big companies has joined hands. Hence, its great interest as a study.

In the future Thomas A. Edison sees "horseless, smokeless, dirtless, noiseless cities." He beholds the coming generations physically and mentally better because they will be greatly relieved from the strain of the fight for existence.

DRINK AND B. B. PLAYERS.

In the current issue of Farm and Fireside are some interesting figures showing the ravages worked by alcohol among star players of big baseball leagues. These figures have been gathered by Hugh S. Fullerton. Mr. Fullerton purposely eliminated the hard drinkers from his experiments; he confined himself to the "bottle of beer" man who thinks that what he takes cannot possibly hurt him.

He kept tab of the records and batting averages of thirty-two moderate drinkers and twenty-four players who did not drink. After eleven years only two of the original thirty-two drinking players are on the diamond while eight of the twenty-four non-drinkers are still playing. Furthermore only five of the drinkers are prosperous as opposed to fourteen of the non-drinkers. Six of the beer contingent are down and out, eight are dead and one is missing—but only three of the non-drinkers are either dead or ruined. The non-drinkers have won more games and pitched more games, stolen more bases and kept up a better batting average, although at the beginning of the eleven years the drinkers surpassed them.

The drinkers were the better hitters at the start, but they declined steadily in batting, while the non-drinkers not only held their pace but improved a little. The drinkers' averages varied largely each year, while the non-drinkers batted within a few

points each season of what they had done the preceding year. The non-drinkers were the more reliable men and he found that the eight non-drinkers played in eight and a fraction more games per season than the eighteen drinkers did."

Portland, Dec. 6.—Cattle—There has been no choice stuff offered today, the real strength of the market could not be ascertained. Top steers however, are quoted at \$7.25. A few cows brought \$5.50. Today's run was more liberal than for some time.

Hogs—Over 7000 hogs were on the market. Prices were maintained and trading was active throughout the day. Quality was somewhat better and buyers were more liberal than usual. Tops brought \$6, bulk at \$5.95.

Sheep—Sixteen hundred head were received for today's market and buyers were eager to buy at slightly advanced prices. Lambs again brought \$7.50, after a weakness in the market for a couple of weeks, all other classes remain steady.
