P. O. INFORMATION

Some Bits of Things About Using The Mails During The Busy Holiday Season.

Addressing—Address parcels fully and plainly, using ink rather than pencil and giving the street, house or rural route number if possible. The name of the sender should also be given preceded by the word "from"—the house number or box number is not sufficient.

Packing—Pack articles carefully and wrap them securely. Do not seal them with special stickers, for sealed parcels are subject to letter postage. If the parcel is to go a long distance be careful in wrapping it to use the best quality of paper and strong cord. For articles that are fragile you can obtain corrugated paper containers of our local merchants. Have your parcels addressed before you present them for mailing.

Insurance—You cannot register 4th class mail, so it is best to insure all valuable parcels. Up to a value of \$5 it costs only 3 cents. From \$5 to \$25 the fee is 5 cents. From \$25 to \$50 the fee is 10 cents. In case the parcel is lost or totally damaged the loss will be paid by the Department.

Rates of Postage—Books, 1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction thereof up to 8 ounces, and regular parcel post rates above that weight.

Photographs and sheet music, 1 cent for each ounce or fraction thereof.

Merchandise up to 4 ounces, 1 cent for each ounce or fraction thereof to any part of the United States.

Merchandise above 4 ounces (parcel post) to any point within 150 miles of Albany, 5 cents for the first pound or fraction thereof, and one cent for each additional pound or fraction thereof. For greater distances inquire at the office.

Weight and Size—Up to a distance of 150 miles of Albany you can send 50 pounds in one package. Over that distance the limit is 20 pounds. The size of a package must not exceed 84 inches in length and girth.

Special Delivery—By attaching a special delivery stamp, costing 10c, the parcel or letter will have immediate delivery. When it arrives at its destination it will be placed in the hands of a special messenger, and will be delivered sooner than the regular mail.

Registry—Money sent at the first class rate, and other valuable matter of the first, second and third class sent by mail should be registered. The fee is 10 cents in addition to the regular postage.

Information to be Given—If the contents of a package is of a fragile nature, easily broken, be sure to give this information. In such cases the parcel is marked "Fragile," and with others of the same class are kept separate from the other mail and receive special care.

If the contents of a package is of a perishable nature it must be so stated by the sender, so that measures may be taken to assure its arrival at its destination in good order.

Inscriptions Permissible—Written inscriptions such as "Merry Christmas," "Happy New Year," "With Best Wishes," are permissible, and books may bear simple dedicatory inscriptions not of a personal nature. Other writing in parcel makes it subject to letter rates.

If it is desired to send a communication along with the parcel, it can be enclosed in an envelope with first class postage prepaid, and be attached to the parcel.

Early Mailing Advised—Mail your parcels early and have them stamped at this office. "Do not open until Christmas." If this plan is followed it insures the timeliness of the Christmas gifts, while the practice of mailing

The Oregonian says: Defending himself against his wife's suit for separate maintenance, J. D. Matlock, 76 years old, a former mayor of Eugene, faced Mary F. parcels late in the hope that they will reach their destination on Christmas day defeats its own object through unavoidable delay due to the congestion of the mails. Fancy stickers bearing the words "Do not open until Christmas" can be bought of our dealers, but in using them do not place them where they will seal the package.

Parcels for Canada—Parcels going to Canada are limited to 4 pounds and 6 ounces, and the rate is 12 cents for each pound or fraction thereof. Parcels containing presents, and being so marked, are not subject to duty.

For Children—Sunday school teachers and others addressing cards or parcels to children should also give the name of parent or guardian and house number.

If you receive a notice to call at the postoffice for a parcel that has not been delivered, bring the notice with you.
