REMARKABLE SUCCESS OF PORTER IN STOCK RAISING

In Ten Years He Has Received \$12,472 in Premiums Besides Large Sales.

Harrisburg Commonwealth: F. H. Porter, of Halsey, whose farm is a few miles north of Harrisburg, is one of the few breeders and raisers of registered cattle in Linn county, and is the pioneer breeder of Red Polled cattle. That he has been successful in his chosen line will be clearly shown in the following lines of this article.

Ten years ago, Mr. Porter, after some little experience with grade cattle, decided, against the advice of friends and neighbors to embark in

the business of raising registered stock. His first herd consisted of four cows which he secured on shares from a man who owned them and did not know what to do with them. To these he added one cow and a bull which he purchased, paying the amazing sum of \$150 for the latter, good naturedly accepting the ridicule of his friends, firmly believing he would have the laugh on them in the end. His first exhibiting was done in 1906, his herd consisting of two cows and one bull, and his premium money that year amounted to \$112.85. In 1915 he exhibited seventeen head, and his premium money will be over \$2,000. His grand total of premium money for the ten years he has been exhibiting amounts to \$12,472.

This enviable position has not been won without much study and work, however. He has made it his aim at all times to breed to Red Polled type of uniform type. He has found that

in exhibiting or selling stock, that the uniform type is always the winner, and many remarks are passed on the uniformity of his cattle. Right here is a point that Mr. Porter brings out, that might be of aid to any about to enter or engage in the cattle business. Keep your cattle as near uniform in size and build as possible. That the Red Polled is a good dual-purpose cow is proven by the fact that one of Mr. Porter's cows, on farm feed, in one year gave 10,000 pounds of milk, testing 5 per cent. Mr. Porter is a strong advocate of the slogan, "Raise what you feed, and feed what you raise." He, with others, believes in that lies the salvation of the valley farmer, that there is more profit in driving your crops to market than there is in hauling them to market. Mr. Porter's sales of breeding stock have extended over five states, Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho and Montana and many of his sales have been for the second or third animal to the same party, or to some one of a neighborhood into which he has sold some stock. Competition is the life of trade, and this applies to stock raising and exhibiting particularly, as the fact that one has to have good stuff to beat his competitor puts new life and blood into the business.
