OUR TELEGRAPHIC SERVICE

Emperors, statesmen, warriors and a staff of newspaper correspondents circling the globe, have worked together in the columns of the Democrat during the last 12 months to make 1915 the most wonderful year for news in the history of journalism.

Through the United Press, the Democrat has been enabled to tap the European war areas, the Orient and domestic field for exclusive news throughout the year. The list of correspondents who have given the Democrat its brilliant stories of the war, is headed by Ed L. Keen, the European manager of the United Press. Among those associated with him have been William G. Shepherd at various battle fronts; William Philip Simms in Paris, Carl W. 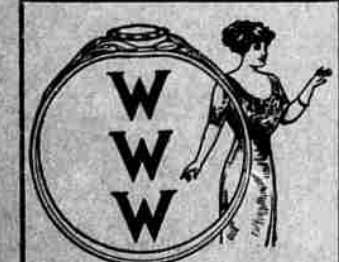
When the Russians were finally driven out of East Prussia last winter, it was the Democrat and the United Press that had the story of the titanic struggle in the northern snows. When Count Zeppelin felt the time had come to defend his air raiding monsters, he did so through the Democrat and the United Press. Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, the German chancellor, made the same selection to announce to the world after the fall of Warsaw, what Germany was still fighting for. The Prime Minister of Bulgaria, through the Democrat and the United Press, proclaimed Bulgaria's final terms for intervention in the war just before German diplomacy won its victory at Sofia.

The fall of the French ministry, the finding of the body of Daniel Frohman, the description of the first Zeppelin raid over the heart of London, the story of the war's first battle between submarines and the Bulgarians' attack on the American flag at Monastir are a few other events of the last year the Democrat through the United Press was able to give its readers in advance of its rivals.

PENNA. MAN AFTER BRIDE

Is in Serbia After Bride, Miss Carbo, a Nurse, Whom He Once Met.

Pittsburg, Jan. 3.—If he had good luck after he sailed from New York for Athens some time ago, Dr. Geo. W. Mellon of this city is down in Belgrade, Serbia, getting ready in the midst of war for his marriage to Miss Zagorka Carbo, said to be one of the uncrowned queens of that devastated little land.

Dr. Mellon, twice decorated for his work with the American Ambulance in the typhus campaign of Serbia, first by Crown Prince Alexander and then by the American Red Cross, has gone back to Serbia with another hospital command commission.

Dr. Mellon met Miss Carbo in the course of his first hospital work in Serbia. She was not, however, a nurse. Just a visitor. As Dr. Mellon's wife, Miss Carbo will help him in his hospital work, which they expect to continue until the war is ended.

Dr. Mellon continued his wooing by letter and cable when he recently was recalled from Serbia by the Red Cross. Miss Carbo's father lost practically all his fortune in the second fall of Belgrade. Dr. Mellon is a graduate of the Medical School of the University of Pennsylvania.

A BABY WEEK NEXT YEAR

Government Arranging for a Week to Be Devoted to Consideration of Babies.

U. S. Department of Labor, Washington, Jan. 3.—1916 is Baby Year. The facts about American babies, the needs of American babies, and America's responsibility to her babies will this year be known as never before, because the first week in March will be Baby Week throughout the country.

More than 400 communities representing every state in the Union are already laying their plans for Baby Week, according to the Children's Bureau of the U. S. Department of Labor, in order that during those seven days the needs of the babies may be so presented that all the parents in those communities will learn a little better how to care for their babies, and all the citizens will realize that they have a special obligation to safeguard the conditions surrounding babies. And it is confidently believed by those who are interested in this nation-wide Baby Week that the remainder of the year will be marked by a strengthening of all community activities for saving babies' lives and giving them a better chance to grow to a healthy maturity.

The Baby Week idea originated in Chicago not quite two years ago. Then New York had a Baby Week, and Pittsburg, and other cities. Such practical benefit has in each case resulted that the General Federation of Women's Clubs has undertaken to promote this nation-wide observance.

State health officials and national organizations interested in public health and child welfare have taken up the plan and in various ways are giving it not only their sanction but their active cooperation. The extension divisions of the state universities have promised special assistance in interesting and helping Baby Weeks in rural communities.
