PREPAREDNESS BUNCOMBE

Militarism Will Mean the Beginning of the End of Democracy, Says Editor.

Washington, Jan. 5.—To those who may be carried away by the cooked-up enthusiasm of the "preparedness" campaign now being conducted throughout the country by the juncture interests and those patriotic societies that are misled by insidious influences to see great danger threatening the United States, it is well to consider an editorial printed recently in the Corona (California) Courier. California, be it remembered, is one of the favorite stamping grounds of the war jingo, where the peril of the Japanese is ever and anon flaunted to stir up "patriotism."

Says this sensible editor, in discussing the political issues of 1916, as quoted in the Literary Digest:

"The issue should not be that old ghost of an issue, the tariff, but rather a return of a truly business administration, run on business principles, with a view of getting the greatest returns for the money spent. All this talk of a greater army and navy is pure buncombe, and the administration should be big enough to see the hidden graft. If only the people would do a little thinking for themselves and not let the big dailies do it all!"

Henry Ford, who is vastly interested in the so-called "preparedness" campaign, said recently after reading much about the matter in the newspapers: "I would like to know how much of this patriotic fervor the editors talk about comes from the hearts of the American citizen and how much from the pocketbook of the men who expect to land the contracts for equipping big military forces proposed. In the first place I think the American knows the country to be in need of no vast armed force, for with that comes the beginning of the end of democracy, and in the second place I think he is too shrewd to permit any such program to be stuffed down his throat by men who are going to make money out of it."

SUNDAY CLOSING LAW WILL BE INITIATED

Over 20,000 of Necessary 22,000 Names Have Already Been Secured Nov. Election.

Portland, Jan. 5.—It was made certain today that an initiative measure to repeal the general Sunday-closing law in Oregon will be placed on the ballot at next November's election, when canvassers for signatures reported a total of slightly over 20,000 names on the initiative petition. As but 22,000 names will be required in all, it was expected tonight that the number would be completed by tomorrow.
