ALBANY COLLEGE.

Albany College this year will celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of its establishment. In a humble way it has played its part well, doing a splendid work for the cause of education.

With an endowment of \$250,000 all paid, the prospects for the future look good. More money is needed, a fund for new buildings, which will eventually come, giving the college what is needed, a working plant, which will enable the school to do special work, so much in demand among students.

At the present time a good many are going elsewhere in order to secure special advantages, for which there is now insufficient provision. Along general lines of education Albany College has no superior as an educator, furnishing the foundation for a solid education.

NATIONAL FOREST BUSINESS

Government Report Shows That Department Had Considerable of an Income.

Portland, Jan. 4.—According to the annual report of Henry S. Graves, chief forester, for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1915, the national forest receipts for the year amounted to \$2,481,469.35.

This amount, it is stated, was the result first, of a timber sale business of \$1,175,133. The amount contributed by District 6 (Oregon, Washington and Alaska) to this timber business was approximately \$207,000. The second source of the national forest receipts was grazing permits which brought in \$1,130,495, to which sum District 6 contributed \$120,210.

The report also states that in addition to the timber sold, there was given away a large amount of material to settlers free of cost, the value of which approximated \$207,000. The revenue foregone through free use of grazing lands is estimated to exceed \$120,000.

The average price of stumpage disposed of in commercial sales was \$2.48 per thousand board feet. The increase of 16 cents over the price of 1914 was due chiefly to large sales of Western yellow pine in Oregon, easily logged and of unusual quality.

The receipts for grazing permits show an increase of \$127,091 over 1914—due partly to the increase in fees charged for grazing of cattle and horses, and partly to the increased number of the former. Improved methods, too, have increased the carrying capacity of the range.
