OUR COLLEGE.

Editorial from Oregon Daily Journal, Portland, January 1, 1916.

The future looks bright for Albany College. With the gift of \$50,000 just received from J. J. Hill its endowments amount to \$250,000. This is a comfortable sum. Much may be done with it under judicious management and it is certain to attract new gifts as the years pass. Albany citizens in good circumstances will not feel that it is quite the proper thing to leave this world without a bequest to the college. We dare say the quarter million that it now has will become a full million in the course of the next twenty years.

But with its actual endowment Albany College can make its educational influence powerfully felt in Oregon. It cannot grow into a big institution with its present means but the small college has a place and mission as well as the big one. The intellectual life thrives best, perhaps, when there are not too many students and professors. Scholarly habits develop and the love of history, poetry and philosophy pursues its way unchecked. There is more and sounder thinking in colleges like Albany than in some of the mammoth universities. A student population may be too numerous for the common good. Among the thousands who gather at Columbia there must be many whose ideals are low and who seek amusement rather than intellectual growth. Sometimes it is to be feared that the weeds outstrip the useful plants. Small colleges can practice moderation. Knowing that they cannot teach everything they have begun of late to restrict their work to a few subjects, aiming at thoroughness rather than breadth. This is wholly admirable. There is none too much thoroughness of any sort in the United States. When we remember that colleges like Albany are somewhat less tyrannized over by the athletic mania than the big universities we perceive another substantial advantage which they possess. Upon the whole, with increasing endowments and increasing public confidence, their situation is enviably hopeful.

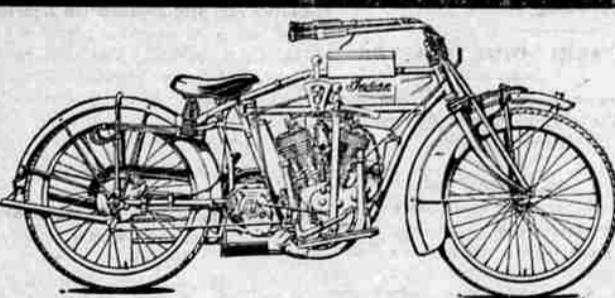

UNDERTAKEN COLOSSAL JOB.

Organization Favoring Legislation for Promotion of Peace and Commerce.

Roson, Jan. 10.—Under the auspices of the Society to Eliminate Economic Causes of War, of which Roger W. Babson is secretary, a conference was to begin here today to promote more uniform legislation in the various nations for the advancement of peace and commerce. Economic conditions believed to be at the bottom of the European war, will be discussed. The delegates believe these conditions must be recognized before satisfactory peace terms can be made.

The delegates believe that each nation must cease legislating solely for its own interests and permit other nations to have a voice in its treatment of shipping, tariffs, immigration and the like. At the closing session Monday, the use of an International Trade flag, to bear the same relation to commerce that the Red Cross flag bears to hospital work, will be considered. Roger Sherman Hoar, ex-assistant attorney general and Walter Wood, of Philadelphia, are to speak.

STEWART'S NEW JOB. Beat Out Some Big Fellows in Run for Nebraska Coaching Stunt.
