GIRLS' IDEAS ABOUT IDEAL YOUNG MEN

At Christian Church Sunday Night Interesting Sermon and Letters.

That there is great interest in knowing what an ideal young man is was shown from the large attendance of four or five hundred at the Christian church last night to hear the letters and sermon on the subject. Before his sermon Rev. Fagan read four or five letters from young ladies on the subject. Here are some of the qualifications from the different letters.

He must be a Christian, honest, pure minded, not use tobacco, love in the true sense, in appearance nice to look on, trustworthy and a protector.

The second one: He must be a Christian, not merely a church member, honest, sincere, industrious, pleasing in manner, good natured, must not gamble nor dance, be kind, sympathetic, have a temper, but get over it quickly.

Third—He is bound to have faults, being human. He should be good and kind to his mother, and the same to his wife; notice the little things of life; strong in character; be able to say no to temptation, physically and morally strong; never have nasty stick in mouth; have Christ as his guide; he won't hang around outside a church waiting to take a girl home; when he calls he will have the sense to leave at 10 o'clock, and hope he goes straight home; ambitious and energetic; not jealous; treats other girls well; tips his hat to his mother; is pure and clean as he expects his girl to be; is optimistic, doesn't grumble, but whistles.

Fourth—Can't smoke a pipe or cigarette, play cards, or tell vulgar stories; should be of good character, a Christian, thoughtful, educated, financier, level-headed and sensible, strong in disposition, but not stubborn; be good to his mother and do everything well. Need not be a musician; as most of them are irritable, hard to get along with; should be honorable in character.

The choir was composed of young men, and George Wilson was heard in a solo, with fine effect.

Rev. Fagan covered the subject with ability in the four points of his text: "Jesus advanced in stature, in wisdom, in favor with men, and in favor with God," covering the physical, the mental, the social and the spiritual. The young man needs to look after the physical taking care of the body, leaving coffin nails and liquors alone; he should be prepared mentally, having a good education as an asset in life; he has a social responsibility of high order, and should weigh well invitations to dancing and card parties and everything else mean. He should be of service to the community, honor his father and mother and keep himself as pure as he would have womanhood. Most important is being in favor with God, an exaltation of the spiritual.

Sunday the subject will be ideal young woman, then the ideal husband, and finally the ideal wife.
