SATURDAY NIGHT THOUGHTS

The massacre of some Americans in Mexico has attracted more attention in this country the past week than anything else, in fact, stirred the country into fever heat. The men had been warned not to go into the country, as it was dangerous; but went anyway, securing passports, which should not have been given under the circumstances. It was a foolhardy trip. Nevertheless they were entitled to protection, and should have been given it by the Carranza government. Regardless of this it was a brutal affair, one that calls for prompt justice, and it is the business of the Mexican government to see that it is meted out. If not, then our own government will very properly take some action with justice in view.

A great deal has been said about the president's waiting policy in reference to Mexican affairs. This is proper, and history will verify it. It is the business of our government to watch, and not act hastily. Mexico has its own government, perhaps a very poor one, but one nevertheless, and it is up to that country to manage her own affairs until they reach a point for the Pan-American republics to step in.

In Europe the war has been progressing chillily, though it is declared that in one engagement twenty-five thousand men were lost, which was some for cold weather. In the spring time this lethargy will undoubtedly be replaced with enough bloodshed to satisfy the most confirmed jingoist.

Considerable interest has been taken over the action in congress looking to the establishment in this country of a vast military power, under the present title of preparedness, a program, which if carried out, will make militarism dominant here, transforming our system of government, going back rather than forward, a course inimical to our democratic form of government.

Perhaps nothing has met with more opposition, from many quarters, regardless of politics, than the proposition to force military training upon the boys of our country. President Wilson very properly opposes it, which may mean its defeat.

Misfits was taught when a boy that bravery does not consist of fighting as much as it does in not fighting. That is, it takes more real bravery not to fight than it does to fight. Anybody can fight after a fashion but not everybody can refrain from fighting when one is angered. It is the same with nations. The U. S. is the furthest from a coward of any nation in the world. It is not afraid, but its policy is one of peace, and it is willing to put up with much, as individuals should do, rather than sacrifice the best blood of the country.
