enormous burden for the people to bear; that it is undemocratic; that the U. S. is entirely safe until her citizens could be mobilized; that our harbors principally need forts, submarines, and mines. It was declared that militarism is the curse of Europe; that the people of this country are the most-patriotic in the world and we have a reserve force of twenty millions, who if wanted would respond, and the backbone of a war is the spirit of the fighters; that it would cause an unnecessary waste of money, unnecessary and improper, costly and difficult, and an industrial army was suggested in place.

The Albany leader, Miss Gibson, put up the strongest rebuttal and presented the closing argument with force. Miss Amy Perfect was heard in a well rendered piano solo while the decisions were being heard. The announcement was that the judges, Prof. Baldwin, of the O. A. C., Prof. Van Aschen, of Willamette and Prof. Wilson, of Turner, had decided unanimously for the affirmative. Soon after it was learned that Albany had also won the negative at Brownsville, and that Lebanon had won the affirmative at home.

Albany will next debate a team from one of the other triangles, selecting a team from the four Albany debaters.
