IDEAL GIRL MUST HAVE MANY GOOD QUALITIES

Among Disqualifications Dancing and Paint Were Emphatically Excluded.

That the ideal young woman must have just as many good qualities as the ideal young man was made plain by the letters read by Rev. Fagan, at the Christian church last night, before a large audience.

Six letters were read. All said she should be a Christian, though one declared that cooking was just as important. All placed cooking as a qualification, all insisted on purity of character. Education was emphasized; dancing and card playing were taboos by some of the writers. One didn't want any fur top shoe girls in his. No up-to-date Buff Cochin for his ideal girl. One didn't want a chafin dish cook. One drew the line at paint, but said some powder might be allowed. One said she should not flirt, should be frank and interested in his business. One, while not objecting to the ideal girl playing Copin, thought choppin' cabbage was also important. Neatness is another essential qualification, also kindness, sympathy, physical perfection, should be musical, like literature, should not be a gossip, not snobbish, should be able to keep secrets, firm of conviction; looks of minor consideration if neat and clean. A plain, everyday kind of a girl, said one.

Rev. Fagan in summing up took seven heads, as follows: 1. Physical Perfection. 2. Personal Appearance. In this point was given a live hit 3. Education. Every girl should have at least a high school education. Better, more. Cooking and care of the home being a part of it. 4. Disposition. Companionable, cheerful, bright, kind, thoughtful. 5. Truthful and trustworthy. Don't act a lie even, as bad as telling one. 6. Good name. Rather to be chosen than great riches. Watch your conduct, company, dress. Familiarity is dangerous. Dancing is the worst, permitting with music positions of familiarity that would not be tolerated without it, no more right with music than without it. 7. Should be a Christian, most important, and the sermon closed with an appeal to young people who have not done so, to make a confession of Christ.
