PLOT DISCOVERED.

There is little doubt that the Mexican massacre was part of a great game to involve the United States in a fight of intervention with Mexico in the interest of the trusts owning large mining and other properties in Mexico, including Hearst. Everything possible has been done to force President Wilson into the embroglio; but he is a man of far-sight and he saw the game being played.

A Los Angeles dispatch says: More than a dozen high officials, including Federal Judges Oscar A. Trippett and B. P. Bledsoe, Collector of Internal Revenue Carter, Postmaster Harrington Brown, Collector of Customs Elliott and United States Marshal Thomas C. Watson, today sent a telegram to President Wilson assuring him that the pressure brought to bear on him in the Mexican crisis is born of malicious misrepresentation.

From Washington comes the following verifying the situation as stated:

Pan-Americanism with which Washington has been ringing for several weeks, played no small part in fixing President Wilson's determination to stand pat against demands for intervention in Mexico, despite terrific pressure following the slaughter of the 18 Americans in Chihuahua. This became known definitely tonight in the wake of disclosures in a telegram sent by Representative Kent of California to the superintendent of Mexican mines in which Kent is largely interested.

Representatives of Latin-American countries, it was admitted authoritatively, have indicated to the administration their approval of the view that Carranza is entitled to the opportunity to handle the situation.

Kent's telegram addressed to L. Hollis, El Paso, Texas, superintendent of the El Cubo mine, Guanajuato, district of Mexico, reads: "View is generally held that murders were part of a shrewd plot to involve us in intervention to the end of crippling Carranza. Cannot predict what action will be taken, but matter is being seriously considered."

"Situation seemingly delicate as I am unofficially informed that Pan-American friends do not favor our intervention. If this is correct, a most important Pan-American understanding may be jeopardized by crude attempts to discredit Wilson and involve us in Mexico squabbles."

"This is a time for serious weighing and maintenance of a sense of proportion in the face of outrages that put fighting men on the spot."

A lengthy statement by Kent tonight, said in part:

"As one not averse to the scrap I feel a desire to get into this row, but when I remember the murder of Chinamen in Wyoming; when I remember other crimes against these inoffensive people that were committed in my own state; and when I remember what I considered, and still consider to be the justifiable killing of a lot of Italians of the Mafia in New Orleans, and realized how our country held back and placed these crimes on the threshold and how angry we were at the assumption of a foreign government that our federal government should take upon itself the responsibility for these outrages. I am compelled to realize that however horrible the offense of irresponsible bandits in Mexico may have been, we, in our national capacity can do no more than our administration is now doing."
