LIVE STOCK REPORT.

Government Gives Report Covering Horses, Mules, Cattle, Sheep and Swine.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 19.—A summary of estimates and numbers and values of live stock on farms and ranges on January 1 for Oregon, compiled by the Bureau of Crop Estimates, U. S. Department of Agriculture, is as follows:

Horses: Number 295,000, compared with 304,000 a year ago and 283,000 five years ago. Value per head, \$89, compared with \$90 a year ago and \$111 five years ago.

Mules: Number, 10,000, compared with 10,000 a year ago and 10,000 five years ago. Value per head, \$93, compared with \$96 a year ago and \$112 five years ago.

Milch cows: Number, 216,000, compared with 210,000 a year ago and 176,000 five years ago. Value per head, \$55, compared with \$63.50 a year ago and \$42 five years ago.

Other Cattle: Number 553,000, compared with \$503,000 a year ago and \$497,000 five years ago. Value per head, \$32.20, compared with \$36.30 a year ago and \$21.60 five years ago.

Sheep: Number, 2,560,000, compared with \$2,563,000 a year ago and 2,672,000 five years ago. Value per head, \$5.20, compared with \$4.50 a year ago and \$3.91 five years ago.

Swine: Number 396,000, compared with 360,000 a year ago and 235,000 five years ago. Value per head, \$7.10, compared with \$9.50 a year ago and \$9.20 five years ago.

BOAT HOUSE WENT DOWN.

Said to Have Been Struck By a Submarine and Sunk. Matter is Being Investigated.

The Mediterranean and North Sea are not the only places where boats are sunk. A calamity happened a few days ago in this city, the United Press has been negligent in reporting. The boat house of Messrs. Weatherford, Schuntermann, et al. on Calipoon Bay, went down into the depths of the cold water. The cause has not been fully ascertained, but there are suspicions of a submarine. The owners were not notified before hand. The proprietors are said to be preparing a note to send to some one, perhaps an ultimatum.

PORTLAND WEEKLY STOCK MARKET REPORT

Portland, Jan. 18.—With a liberal supply of 1235 cattle on hand the market did not do as well as the previous

week. A couple loads of pulp fed steers brought \$7.75 and one load of cows brought \$6.20. Taking in every consideration the market could be quoted steady to a little easier. Loss in price showing principally on common classes.

Another jump in hog prices. With 5200 head on hand the market made a sensational advance and set the top at \$7.25, 35 cents over last week's top. Bulk of stuff went at \$7.10. Quality was very good.

Sheep remained on a steady basis at the North Portland market this morning with lambs selling at \$8.25; ewes at \$6.55. A total of 2550 sheep were counted in. Market is closing very strong.
