"AVENGING CONSCIENCE" EXCEEDS ALL EXPECTATIONS

Great Griffith Production Shown Here Last Night Before Large House.

"Avenging Conscience," which opened at the Globe Theatre last night under the management of Sol Baum, a former resident of this city, and Orton E. Goodwin, formerly a prominent Portland newspaper man, who have the states rights, is truly a wonderful picture and all that has been claimed for it. The house was filled to capacity and those who witnessed this great Griffith production saw the best picture ever exhibited in this theatre.

Griffith is indeed a great producer, and if his "Birth of a Nation" is as good we are anxious to see it when it is exhibited here in April. This genius in working out a picturization of Poe's "Annabelle Lee" and other verses uses a variety of strange effects that have the power of carrying one from the lowest depths to the highest planes. From a psychological standpoint the working out of the play is perfect. Every action fits in logical sequence.

With Henry Walthall and Blanche Sweet in the leading roles and supported by a cast of stars, the acting is another feature of this great picture. Mr. Walthall's emotional work is great, and in the scene where the detective works in his conscience by tapping on a table, Walthall makes it so realistic that one almost hears the murdered man's heart beat with him.

The central thought of the play is the wonderful workings of man's conscience, the element that separates man from his brute instincts. The theme is laid on the taking of a human life, but as Griffith states in the beginning, the moral is pointed at any sin in life. Good use is made of Poe's "The Telltale Heart" in bringing out the working of the guilty mind, and "Annabelle Lee" is effectively used as the theme for the love story.

The picture will be shown again tonight for the last time in this city, and if expressions from last night's crowd count for much, the house will be crowded to capacity.

NATIONAL FORESTS DOING BIG WORK FOR THE PEOPLE

Portland, Jan. 24.—During the past fiscal year, approximately 45,000 persons obtained timber directly from the national forests.

Since 1908, there have been taken from the national forests five billion board feet of wood and timber products.

Approximately 40 million feet of timber are cut annually under the sales from the Chugach and Tongass national forests of Alaska.

During the fiscal year 1915, 44 of the 162 national forests paid their local operating costs, or in other words, were self supporting.

The commercial sales of timber on the national forests of Oregon for the past fiscal year amounted to 544,673,000 board feet, valued at \$1,629,000; and on the national forests of Washington to 27,854,000 board feet, valued at \$34,867.

During 1915, timber to the amount of 122,168,000 board feet, valued at \$240,000, was given under free use to settlers residing in and near the national forests. In Oregon this free use timber amounts to 12,122,000 board feet, valued at \$13,342, and in Washington to 2,371,000 board feet, valued at \$2,953.
