of obscene pictures and living models. There is a free exercise of individuality, and the people have clear ideals and are patriotic. If the Allies are victorious it will be France that secures victory.

In Italy Rome is Italy. Italian unbelief is worse than in France.

Little good can be said of Turkey. It has hardly any good men. Its annual tax is from 10 to 50 per cent. 95 per cent of the people are illiterate. The military takes everything. Here degradation prevails. The Sultan has \$5,000,000 worth of ware on his table, solid gold.

Germany and Austria are composed of great and noble people. There is no visible poverty and beggars are never seen; but women work in the fields and on the railroads, and Sunday is a day of pleasure. German nationalism has done much to destroy faith in the Bible there. There is a central control of education and the church, practical and materialistic.

Russia is dull and stupid, with little thinking, but patriotism is devout.

Belgium is much like France and Holland like Germany. Switzerland is a mixture and the Balkans creatures of passion and strife.

It went to sea last night to dump garbage, and encountered a terrific storm. It struck the rocks this morning and quickly went to pieces.
