"CARMEN" PROVED ALL THAT WAS EXPECTED

Picture Version of Grand Opera Witnessed By Packed House at Rolfe Theatre.

A house crowded to the doors witnessed the opening performance of "Carmen" at the Rolfe theatre last night. And the verdict seemed to be that the screen version of this famous opera was just as popular as the old opera itself. The presentation was one to please all classes. For those who like the thrilling, there were plenty of thrills. The beauty of the classic stood out for those who appreciated that part of the play.

It is truly a great play, and Raoul A. Walsh, one of the Wm. Fox producers, certainly shows his genius in the filming of this production. The cities of Seville and Cordova are reproduced most vividly, and the street scenes are so real that one almost forgets that he is looking at a picture. The bull fight was true to life, showing a huge, plunging brute dashing with blind fury at the skillful picador, goring a horse, and finally getting killed. The dash of Jose over the precipice was well taken. The horse and rider are clearly seen hurtling through the 85 feet of space, turning over in the air, and finally plunging into the deep pool of water. Theda Bara in this picture stands out above all her other efforts. As the dashing, floating, pouting gypsy beauty, she came up to the requirements as not other actress can. She appears constantly in all parts of the picture, revealing new charms with each appearance. The entire cast is good, and is the largest ever seen in a picture in this city. Over 5000 people are seen sitting in the stadium at the bull fight, and hundreds of others are shown in street scenes. With tonight's performance will close the exhibiting of the Fox features in Albany, and it may be many months before Theda Bara is seen here again.
