But why do not the other features, which are nearly as good, draw the same? The Paramount features were tried out here early this fall, but after the appearance of Mary Pickford the attendance fell to such a point that the manager gave up in disgust and cancelled the following bills. The Metro features were given a short trial by another theatre. Some of the best actors on both the legitimate and shadow stage were brought here in high class plays, but the support received caused a speedy cancellation. George Kleine is one of the greatest theatrical managers in the world and his stage productions draw the top prices in New York. His picture plays were tried out here for several weeks this winter, and some of the best plays on the stage obtainable exhibited here, but the service was too costly to continue with the meagre support received. That was cancelled.

And the last to go was the splendid Fox Features, which were cancelled with the production of "Carmen" last Saturday night. All winter these pictures have been shown here, sometimes drawing full houses and sometimes showing to but a handful. There are no better pictures made than the Fox features, their settings being the most elaborate screened, the acting the best and the producing managers the leaders in their profession. In larger cities these pictures play at prices ranging from 25 cents to \$2 a seat, but enough people on the average have not turned out here to pay expenses at 10 cents admissions. It is surely a problem to find just what the people want.

At present Albany is seeing pictures made by the Vitaphone-Selig-Biograph-Essanay combine, the Pathe, Mutual and Universal companies. However another big feature service is being contemplated and will be tried out before Albany audiences in the near future. It will not show for 10 cents, however, but will draw 15 cents at every performance.

DAIRYMEN ORGANIZE A COOPERATIVE DAIRY EXCHANGE

31 Cooperative Creameries Meet in Portland to Further Interests.

Portland, Ore., Feb. 1.—(By U. P.)—The Oregon Cooperative Dairy Exchange is an actual organization today as the result of a meeting of representatives of 31 cooperative creameries from all parts of the state yesterday. The Exchange will operate a central marketing agency in Portland for the purpose of insuring fair competition in selling dairy products.

J. D. Mickle, state dairy and food commissioner, called the meeting. W. K. Newell, president of the Oregon Dairymen's association, presided at yesterday's session in the Imperial hotel.

Prof. H. R. Graves and Dr. Hector McPherson, of Oregon Agricultural College, attended the meeting. Representatives from cooperative creameries in every dairying section of the state were present.

The following officers were elected: President, Ed. Cary, Carlton. Executive committee, R. C. von Lehe, Philomath; W. A. Smiley, Reedsport; J. J. Whealdon, Albany; J. Kirchen, Oregon City.

BIG ORDERS FOR LUMBER ANTICIPATED THIS MONTH

France Is Reported to Be in the Market For 41,000,000 Feet.

Portland, Ore., Feb. 1.—(By U. P.)—A rush of lumber orders is expected as soon as weather conditions permit the beginning of construction work, manufacturers and steamship operators declared today.

George Hardy, head of the Chamber of Commerce, telegraphed from New Orleans that agents of the French government are in the United States to buy 41,000,000 feet of lumber. Most of this probably will be purchased in the Pacific Northwest.

Immediate orders for thousands of long timbers are expected from the California oil districts, where the recent storms have demolished hundreds of derricks. Oregon and Washington are practically the only states which can supply these timbers. Two large steamers and several smaller sailing vessels are now en route to Portland for cargoes which already have been sold.
