Y. W. C. A. WILL BE FIFTY YEARS OLD THIS MONTH

Has Played a Great Part in the Building Up of Character of Young Women.

(By United Press)

New York, Feb. 1.—Throughout the United States, beginning today, the Young Women's Christian Association starts its national jubilee month celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of the founding the first association, in Boston, March 3, 1866. Nine hundred and sixty-six associations, including city, county and student have developed and exist today as a result of that first association, which was started by a society of women to help self-supporting girls who came to the city to seek employment.

The organization membership in America today numbers 342,948. The association owns millions of dollars worth of property in buildings to which hundreds of thousands of young women go for education, recreation, to make friends and to find a place to live. Beginning with a nation-wide membership rally today, the jubilee month will be filled with celebrations and events.

February 6 and 7 will be pioneer days, on which every member of the organization, past and present, will report back to the local association which was her first interest. On February 22 the historical pageant "Girls of Yesterday and Today" will be presented in every association building in the country. This will be a four-act play in which the Girl of 1866 and the Girl of 1916 will interpret through the medium of the other members of the company, the scenes that pass before them. There are only two speaking parts in the pageant. On March 3rd will be celebrated the Fiftieth Birthday of the association's work in America.

Other pioneer Associations bearing the name of Women's Christian Associations were organized at Hartford, Conn., Providence, R. I., Pittsburgh and Allegheny, Pa., in 1867. Cincinnati, Cleveland and St. Louis followed in 1868 by forming similar societies. Similar associations were formed in St. Joseph, Mo., Scranton, Pa., Kansas City, Mo., Minneapolis, Minn., and Toledo, Ohio. All city associations emphasized religious meetings and Bible instruction and as early as 1872 the New York City Y. W. C. A. commenced a Bible class which shortly developed an average attendance of 600. Employment agencies have always been an important part of Association work. In 1872 Hartford, Conn., erected the first building for this purpose. The first Association summer house was built at Asbury Park by the Philadelphia Association in 1874. In 1891 Kansas City, Mo., opened the first self-serving lunch room, now known as the cafeteria.

In 1866 a convention was held at Lake Geneva and the National Young Women's Christian Association, which later became the American Committee with headquarters at Chicago, was formed.

BATTLED FOR THEIR BRIDES.

The Most Thrilling Wedding Day in the World's History.

Do you know what was the most thrilling wedding day in the history of the world? There have been many romantic marriages and many nuptial services that had to be deferred because of the opposition of parent or rival, but all of them pale into dingy gray when compared with the colorful spectacle of the abduction and recapture of the Venetian brides in the early winter of 923, when Caudino II, the noble doge, was lending his presence to the biggest wedding party in the history of the Church of San Pietro. It had long been the custom for all the noble brides to be married on St. Mary's day. It was, moreover, the custom for the brides to bring with them all their jewels and their dowries, in gold coin, enclosed in handsomely carved chests.

The latter fact was well known in Trieste, that ancient Roman colony which was the harbor for bands of pirates who were most clever navigators. On this richest of all St. Mary's wedding days the ceremony for more than a score of brides had already begun when the pirates from Trieste burst into the church, captured the brides and their dowries and carried them to the waiting boats. Thanks to the Trunkmakers' union, there were several boats waiting, and in these the bridegrooms and the sturdy trunk-makers gave pursuit. There was a battle royal, one of the most thrilling sea fights on record, and before midnight all had been safely married.—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.
