ALBANY MUSICIANS WILL HEAR FAMOUS SPANISH SINGER

Great Baritone de Gogorza to Appear There Monday Evening in Popular Concert.

Quite an interest in Albany music and society circles has been aroused by the appearance of the eminent baritone Emilio de Gogorza in concert at Salem next Monday evening. A number have signified their intention of attending. DeGogorza is said by many to have the finest voice of any baritone on the concert stage. Thousands attended his concerts in San Francisco. He gave return concerts there. He sang to capacity houses, and many were turned away.

DeGogorza is proud to say that he is an American by birth the educated in Europe, and acclaimed as the great Spanish baritone. 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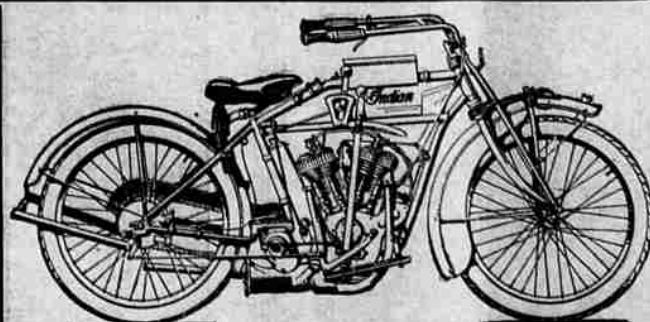
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
