GOOD LOGANBERRY PROJECT.

Salem Men Will Make Effort to Get Government to Buy Loganberries for Employees.

Statesman: Because the Oregon loganberry has not been given a sufficient introduction to make the demand keep pace with the supply, the board of directors of the Salem Fruit union will attempt, through the Oregon senators and representatives in congress, to induce the government to purchase dried loganberries for its employees both in this country and in the possessions. A resolution asking the Oregon delegation to take action to bring about this market has been forwarded to Washington.

The idea was first conceived by Charles L. McNary, president of the board of directors of the fruit union when he visited Panama last year where the government employs thousands of people. Mr. McNary found them using fruit from other states of the union, but none from Oregon.

Demand for U. O. Men.

Guard: Development of Oregon's institutions of higher education was not rapid until the last few years; yet the state has contributed considerably to the faculties of colleges and universities.

Of the University alone 47 graduates hold instructional or other positions on the staffs of degree-granting institutions.

Some of the institutions are University of Washington, University of Denver, University of Georgia, Washington State College, Vassar College, Kalamazoo College, Albany College, University of Wisconsin, Cornell University, Pennsylvania State College, and University of Idaho.

The positions held range from presidencies to fellowships; the departments from engineering to fine arts.

PRESIDENT KERR'S EASTERN TRIP IMPORTANT ONE

Is After Physical Director For Health and Efficiency Not Merely Football.

Oregon, Agricultural College, Corvallis, Feb. 14.—President W. J. Kerr has left on an extended trip through the eastern part of the United States on business connected with the college. One main purpose of his visit is to consult with Secretary Houston, of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, on cooperative work in agriculture, and home economics. An adjustment of plans already in operation will be sought and the advisability of introducing new projects investigated.

Another matter of great importance to be considered is the selection of a professor of agricultural education, a director of the proposed physical education. Concerning the last named, Professor Kerr says:

"This is an opportune time to carry forward the policy that was instituted six years ago for training the many rather than the few. To further this we need a man of broad gauge, who is especially prepared for this work and appreciates its great importance, and is ambitious to train all the students for health and efficiency rather than merely to turn out winning teams."

The president will also visit Carnegie Technical Institute, Brooklyn Polytechnic, Pennsylvania State, Ohio University, Purdue, Iowa State College and the Universities of Illinois and Wisconsin, to observe the newer ideas in technical education. He expects to be gone about five weeks.

One That Shall Require all Woolen Fabrics to Be Properly Branded as to Quality.

The Merchant Tailors' Association of Portland, Oregon, sends congratulations to the National Tailors' association of America, and we would say we hope the time is not far off when we can join and become a part of this association so as to help push along the good work of elevating the tailoring trade. Especially would we join with them in demanding from the government a United States law compelling the manufacturers to honestly brand textile fabrics so that the purchasing public could know what they are parting with their money for, in the case of woollens, whether they are buying fabrics made from wool directly from the sheep's back or wool made from old rags that have been reworked from one to twenty times and known to the trade as shoddies.
