AMERICAN CONDENSED MILK IS IN GREAT DEMAND

Washington, D. C., Feb. 17.—American condensed milk is enjoying a vogue in Europe that it never knew in peaceful times. The exports from this country in 1915 amounted to 76,000,000 pounds valued at \$6,000,000, according to figures furnished by the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce, and the bulk of these exports went to Europe. In normal times the value of condensed milk sold abroad varies between \$1,000,000 and \$2,000,000, and ordinarily the best customers are Cuba, Panama, China, and Mexico.

The increased exports of condensed milk to Europe are easy to explain, under the circumstances, but there has been an increase in imports from European countries that is puzzling. Italy's recent participation in the American trade has caused some comment, but the fact that Holland and Switzerland sold much larger quantities of milk in the United States in 1915 than ever before is considered more remarkable, for these two countries have access to practically all markets in Europe. The total imports into the United States from all countries in 1915 were valued at practically \$2,000,000, or one-third of the exports, and although Canada furnished more than half, Holland did a business, approximating \$800,000 as against less than \$300,000 the year previous. Switzerland now is selling to us at a rate of \$250,000 a year, where formerly practically no milk came from that country.

ROBIN NELSON GOES INTO THE SAW MILL BUSINESS

Will Be Associated With His Father-in-law at Napavine, Washington.

Centralia, Wash., Feb. 17.—J. P. Guerrier, of this city, announced today that work will be begun at once on the erection of a new sawmill near Napavine to cut timber owned by him on the Newaukum River. Mr. Guerrier owns one of the finest tracts of timber to be found west of the Cascades. He is said to have sold a portion of it recently for \$100,000, but retained the rest for cutting in the new mill, which he hopes to have ready for operation early this summer.

Mr. Guerrier's son, a student in the State University, and his son-in-law, Robin H. Nelson, until Tuesday assistant city engineer of Hoquiam, will share with Mr. Guerrier active management of the new mill.
