SATURDAY NIGHT THOUGHTS.

A week these days without something on the Lusitania would be an exceedingly quiet one. The plot in a way deepens, and yet it ought not to be a hard one to solve. In this matter of what should be done in the cases of submarines attacking armed merchantmen without warning it might be well for this country to consider what it would do if it was the nation at war fighting for its life. The chances are that the very men who are yelling for the U. S. to reject the decree in a like case would be the first to insist on the U. S. making a like decree. One thing the people of this country can do is to keep off of armed merchantmen. They must know they are in danger and rushing headlong into the jaws of trouble.

As a matter of fact, though, a nation would do well to give the warning, on the side of humanity. In the first place, though, no merchantman should be armed these times, for the small equipment carried is of practically no value, doing more harm than good, merely inviting trouble, without enough arms to make a showing in any kind of a fight.

The average home is better off without a revolver in it than it is with one laying around in a drawer, inviting trouble.

In the history of the United States there has never been anything that called for the solution of quite so many problems as the present war. It has been a continual round of things to solve.

People who return from Portland tell of the striking effect of the prohibition of the liquor traffic there. Where saloons were there are other places of business doing well, and the front door smell no longer affects the street. A man putting in a big \$750,000 plant in San Francisco for the making of beer expects to see that state go dry within two or three years, and is putting up the plant with a view of transforming it into another business, and has the profit all figured out.

The individual or community who does right almost universally receives the proper reward in the long run, and the man never loses anything by turning from what is harmful to his fellow men to what will make it easier for them to do right.

The Russians have been encouraged this week by a big victory over the Turks, which gives them a chance to advance in an effort to regain lost ground. Altogether the Russians have less advantage than when the war started and they were going to reach Berlin in two or three weeks.

R. R. COM. INSPECTION TOUR.

Yesterday Made a Trip Over the Proposed Roseburg and Eastern Railroad.

Review: With a view of establishing the county road crossings for the proposed Roseburg & Eastern Railroad, in accordance with the laws regulating the operation of common carriers within the state, Thomas K. Campbell and Frank Miller, members of the Oregon Railroad Commission; William P. Ellis, stenographer for that body; Attorney O. P. Coshaw, representing the Roseburg & Eastern Railroad company; County Judge Marsters and Commissioner Harry Pinkston; C. L. Seelman, local representative for Kendall Brothers, and F. M. Von Planta, civil engineer, left here early today for a trip over the route of the proposed railroad. They should return here some time this evening.

In an interview here last night, Mr. Campbell, who is the veteran member of the Oregon Railroad Commission, stated that it was a duty of the commission to inspect the proposed route of railroads and establish the road crossings. It was to take up this work that the members of the railroad commission were invited to come here today. When the party left here this morning they expected to make the greater part of the trip by automobile. A small part of the trip will have to be made on foot.
