MAN EDUCATED SEVENTEEN.

Bachelor Teacher Used His Money in Education of Young People With Splendid Results.

Everett, Wash., Feb. 17.—Devoting most of his life and money to educating orphans and deserving students, F. D. Mack, teacher in the Central School here, says he thinks he has done his duty after educating and supporting 17 boys and one girl through high school and college in the last 16 years at an average cost of about \$2500 each.

Mack made the money to educate his proteges by writing short stories, novels and articles, of which he says he has published hundreds under many non de plumes.

Two of the boys graduated from the University of Washington last year. All are now through school. Mack is a bachelor and says he never intends to marry. He lives simply on his salary as a teacher.

Of the 14 now alive, two are druggists, two are university instructors, one a physician, one a lumber broker, one a civil engineer, another electrical engineer, one a mining engineer, one a banker, one a dentist, one a lawyer and the one girl is a music teacher. Mack has refused to let any pay him for their education.
