RUNNING A NEWSPAPER.

After the Eugene Guard had gone into the hands of a receiver the new editor, after investigating the situation presented the following editorial on running newspapers:

The average citizen in any community has little conception of the newspaper business, nor does he appreciate the fact that newspapers do more to advertise a community than all other agencies combined.

The dollar spent by the advertiser or the subscriber represents something more than space or the purchase price of the copies of the publication delivered day after day.

The newspaper is quasi-public by its nature. There is always a question about where it should and where it should not accept money for some service it performs.

The church is given more free space in the newspapers than any other institution. This is because the publisher believes in the church and that its activities constitute a great influence for good in the community.

What can be said of the church and what it should or should not pay for, can be said of lodges, clubs and various societies, which come under the heading of organizations in connection with which there is always a large amount of matter which can be properly classified as news.

The individual subscriber has also claimed a large amount of space, the use of which he has considered a sort of personal courtesy extended to him by the publisher.

In the city of Eugene the newspapers have been carrying a large amount of free matter, which should more properly be classed as advertising, than any other city of similar size in the northwest, notwithstanding that no city of similar size in the northwest can boast of better newspapers.

It will be the policy of the Guard in the future to print all news and to print it when it is news, but an established charge will be made for all signed notices which extend an invitation, announcements advertising any money-making activity by any church, lodge or society, political announcements, cards of thanks, obituaries offered for publication after accounts of deaths or funerals have ceased to be news, and matter of similar character.

This is business. It is in the inter-

est of maintaining a high standard newspaper which will be a credit for the people who build it, the people who pay for it and the city itself.
