A DRAMATIC COURT SCENE.

In the Case of a Young Man Who Stole Diamonds at Eugene, He Said Because of Necessity.

Job Dennis was taken through the city from Eugene to Salem to spend a year or more, according to behavior, in the state penitentiary, for stealing two diamond rings from a resident in Eugene. The Guard gives the following dramatic scene in connection with the sentence:

"Your honor, I stole because it was a case of necessity. I am guilty of the crime charged, but I ask your leniency before you pass sentence."

"The law recognizes no excuse like that. I sentence you, for not less than one year, and not more than seven years in the state penitentiary at Salem," said Judge G. F. Skipworth.

Judge Skipworth looked straight into the eyes of Dennis, who did not flinch. He tried to assume an air of bravado. The court room was deathly still. Judge Skipworth ordered Dennis to be seated.

Judge Skipworth proceeded to the next case before the court.

For a minute or more, Dennis sat stoically in his seat before Judge Skipworth. Then, when attorneys were arguing a technical question, Dennis leaned to another accused criminal who was seated beside him and whispered some remark to the man. Both smiled.

The twelve jurors who were sitting in the jury box in a civil case, which was interrupted for the criminal proceeding, watched Dennis almost to a man. From the expression on their faces, they seemed to pity the young man who had just been sentenced to the penitentiary. But when Dennis started to smile and joke with his neighbor, this sympathy seemed to leave the jurors.

REINCARNATION OF SOULS SHOWN IN PICTURES

RIFLES BECOMING POPULAR.

Clubs Being Organized. The War Suggests That Men Should be Able to Use Rifle.

Boston, Feb. 29.—The spring tournament of the Massachusetts association of the National Rifle Association begins here today with special matches at the Bay State school of Musketry's new ranges. The matches will continue for seven or eight weeks, and with the increasing number of clubs joining the association, promises to produce some hard fought contests. Massachusetts has had a revival of rifle clubs this year, because of the preparedness spirit which has swept the state. Hundreds of new clubs have been formed, and plenty of trophies have been offered for the marksmen. Special interest is shown in the individual matches held at the new ranges on Gainsborough street, Boston, and a table of figures kept by Major Portal, who has been one of the leading factors in the newly popular sports, shows that the standard of efficiency has been greatly increased. The department stores of Boston have taken up the rifle club idea and nearly all have teams up from among the employees. Colleges and schools around the city also are showing increasing interest in rifle teams, and many have applied for membership in the N. A. R.

NEW POSTOFFICE BILL

House Has a Bill Providing for the Space System in Place of the Old Weight System.

Washington, Feb. 28.—Over bitter and persistent opposition the house tonight passed the annual postoffice appropriation bill with its provisions for substituting a space basis for the present weight system of paying railroads for carrying mails and prohibiting any increase in the existing limit of 50 pounds on parcel post packages. The measure carries appropriations aggregating \$321,000,000 to operate the postal system during the coming year.

The fight against the space payment plan, long advocated by the postoffice department and vigorously opposed by the railroads, was led by Representative Cannon, of Illinois. His

proposal that the matter of rate adjustment be left to the Interstate Commerce commission was defeated, 79 to 54. Representative Lewis, of Maryland, contended to the last for a 100-pound limit for the parcel post. He declared the limit of 50 pounds would "hog-tie" the postal service and send up the stocks of the express companies. The bill finally was passed without a record vote. A motion to send it back to the committee was voted down, 174 to 139.
