Recently a famous aviator was try-
ing for an altitude record. He will not
try any more. He fell nearly 13,000
feet. Even if he had made the record
and lived, what's the glory? That
old saying "Vanity, vanity, all is van-
ity," keeps coming before one. All the
world is seeking for some kind of a
record, doing something new that has
never been done before. It is a good
effort if it is along the line of some-
thing that will help the world in its
progress for a better manhood and
womanhood, but how futile when
there is nothing in view. The notoriety
of the act is what sends the man
forward to chance's doom. In a less-
er way all around people do little acts
for the notoriety of it, without so-
berly thinking of the results. The old
saying "Vanity, vanity, all is vanity,"
keeps coming before one. Long risks af-
fecting character as much as along
risks affecting life.

APPEALS TO THE MASSES.

The president does entirely right to
get the views of the people and their
representatives on important matters
before acting, keeping in touch with
the masses. The following from the
Minneapolis News is to the point on
the subject:

Strange that Washington was sur-
prised and shocked by the president's
appeal to congress for a vote on the
proposal to warn Americans off bel-
ligerent merchant ships.

Ours is called a representative form
of government. One man cannot cor-
rectly represent the country's senti-
ment in every particular, on every oc-
casion.

Since his inauguration, Woodrow
Wilson has refused to be bound by
precedent and custom, and in many
other ways manifested a strong desire
to get into close touch with the rep-
resentatives of the people sent to
Washington from every part of the
nation.

He has seen two of his secretaries
resign because they thought his poli-
cies were not endorsed by the people.
He has had to make personal appeal
to factions in congress in order to
prevent open revolt against measures
of vital importance to his plans of
handling foreign relations and pre-
serving genuine neutrality.

Relations with Germany have been
at a stage bordering on diplomatic
rupture. He is trying to put the most
vital of all questions up to the peo-
ple's immediate representatives. He is
doing just exactly what the kings,
kai-sers, czars and courtiers of Europe
did not do. He honestly believes he is
right in his attitude toward Germany's
submarine warfare but he recognizes
that there is a power, a responsibility,
in this country greater than his own,
and that is the will of the people;
and his only way to an understanding
of that will is through appeal to the
representatives of the people.

He is too proud to fight the will of
the people.
This appeal is a novelty. It is Wil-
sonian. It is right. It is the act of an
executive, not of a monarch, and ex-
presses that glorious distinction in a
man that the people will like.

of the City of Albany, Oregon, until
7:30 o'clock p. m. March 22, 1916, for
the improvement of Washington
Street from the South line of Ninth
Street to the North curb line of
Thirteenth Street, in the City of Al-
bany.

Said improvement to be made in
the following manner to-wit:

First. By grading said street to the
proper subgrade.

Second. By paving the roadway of
said street with asphaltic concrete
sections with asphaltic concrete
pavement on an asphaltic concrete
foundation.

Third. By laying and constructing
asphaltic concrete headers.

Fourth. By constructing catch bas-
ins.

Fifth. By constructing inlets.

Sixth. By laying vitrified sewer
pipe.

Seventh. By tapping of main and
lateral sewers.

Said improvement to be made in
accordance with the Charter and or-
dinances of the said City of Albany,
and the plans, specifications and es-
timates of the City Engineer on file
in the office of the City Recorder,
where said plans may be seen and
specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 8:00 o'clock
p. m. March 22, 1916.

No proposal or bid will be consid-
ered unless accompanied by a certi-
fied check payable to the City of Al-
bany in an amount equal to five per
cent of the aggregate bid, to be for-
feited as fixed and liquidated damages
in case the bidder neglects or refuses
to enter into a contract and provide
an approved bond in a sum equal to
50 per cent of the amount to be paid
under such contract, for the faithful
performance of the work within ten
days after notification of award of
contract to such bidder.
