**CYRIL SCOTT, TO BE
SEEN IN PICTURES**

Scenes filmed hundreds of feet below the surface of the earth in a mine in the Pittsburgh district are introduced into "The Lords of High Decision," the Red Feather five-reel adaptation of Meredith Nicholson's novel, in which Cyril Scott is featured. The taking of the pictures was a dangerous undertaking as the installation of powerful arc lamps along the roof of the mine caused the mining engineers who superintended the visit of the Universal officials to fear that a fire-damp explosion might occur.

Cyril Scott also accompanied the excursion into the mine's depths and enjoyed an experience that probably never would have come to him on the speaking stage. Mr. Scott adopted the stage as a profession when he was seventeen, for some time was a member of the Minnie Maddern Fiske company and later joined Richard Mansfield. He played abroad in "Flora," and then came to New York in the internationally famous musical comedy. Since then he has appeared in many successful Broadway productions, his most recent plays being "Value Received," "The Man Who Found a Way," and "The Lottery Man." Then for three years he toured the country in "The Prince Chap," in which he enjoyed a tremendous vogue. This play will be at the Hub Theatre Wednesday and Thursday.
